AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance providing for the maintenance, repair and upkeep of the public highways of St. Tammany parish, by a contract. Whereas, after providing for all statutory charges, all charges for services rendered actually under time contract, and all necessary and usual charges provided for by ordinances or resolutions, and whereas there is an annual appropriation made by this body of two (2) mills out of the general funds of the parish for the building, maintenance and construction of public highways, and whereas this body has this day accepted the bid of Henry Keller for the maintenance and repair, according to specifications on file with this body, the public highways of St. Tammany parish, and has authorized the president of this board to execute the necessary contract and bond with the said Henry Keller for the performance of said work, all of which will more fully and at large appear by a reference to said contract and specifications; and whereas it will require about \$7500 annually for a period of three years to meet the obligations of the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany under said contract:

Section 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, La., in regular session, that \$7500 per year, or so much thereof as may be necessary out of the special tax (8) mill appropriation made annually for the benefit of the public highways, be set aside and dedicated from said two (2) mill fund which is hereby pledged and dedicated to be annually paid, to meet the obligations due under said contract for a period of three years; said amount to be placed in the budget for the years 1916, 1917 and 1918, all in accordance with said contracts entered into by and between the police jury of St. Tammany and Henry Keller.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance prohibiting the closing of ditches along the public highways of St. Tammany parish, with logs, earth, or other substance, or driving across same at improper places, and providing a penalty therefor. Section 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of St. Tammany parish, that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to place or cause to be placed in the ditches or gutters of the public highways of St. Tammany parish, any logs, timber, earth, or other substances for the purpose of effecting a crossing for teams or otherwise.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to drive any teams, wagons, or other vehicles across the ditches and gutters of any public road or highway in this parish other than at the regular crossings provided for by the parish.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, that no culverts or bridges shall be constructed for private purposes to cross any open ditch, gutter, or drain of the public highways of St. Tammany parish, without the knowledge and approval of the Superior Council of public highways in the parish.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, that any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and liable to a fine of not more than \$25.00, or 30 days imprisonment in the parish jail, or both, at the discretion of the court.
