PROCLAMATION OF ELECTION.

Town of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana.

Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Covington, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany, at a lawful meeting held in Covington, La., on December 7th, 1915, I, P. J. Lacroix, Mayor of the town of Covington hereby give notice that in compliance with said ordinance a special election will be held in the town of Covington, State of Louisiana, on the 11th day of January, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to vote under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, at such election, the following proposition:

"To incur debt and issue bonds for the town of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, to the amount of Seventy-One (\$71,000) Thousand Dollars, to run for a period of thirty-one years from the 1st day of February, 1916, to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum from the 1st day of February, 1916, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of February and the 1st day of August of each year, and issued in such denominations, payable at such time and in such installments, with such other details relating thereto as shall be determined by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen and authorized by law, for the purpose of erecting, constructing and equipping a system of waterworks and sewerage for supplying the inhabitants of the town of Covington, with water and sewers, the title to such waterworks and sewer system shall vest in the town of Covington, Louisiana."

For the purpose of the election the polling place will be the courthouse on Boston street in the town of Covington, and P. J. Martindale, Ben Fontan and C. L. Smith have been appointed as commissioners, and R. L. Aubert clerk.

At said election the polls will open at 7 o'clock a. m., and close at 5 o'clock p. m., and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Notice is also hereby given that on the 12th day of January 1916, at 10 o'clock a. m., at the Mayor's

office in the town of Covington, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen will convene and will proceed in open session to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election.

It is advisable to insure registered and C. O. D. parcels. The cost is only three cents for packages up to \$5.00; \$5.00 to \$25.00, 5 cents; \$25.00 to \$50.00, 10 cents; \$50.00 to \$100, 25 cents.
