CHARTER OF THE SOUTHERN INDUSTRIAL AND BURIAL ASSOCIATION.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany, Town of Covington.

Be it known that on this 15th day of December, A. D., One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifteen, Before me, Fred J. Heintz, Jr., a notary public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, there in residing, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared, that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana, they have consented and agreed and bind themselves and their heirs, assigns and agents, hereafter to become associated, to form to form themselves into and constitute a corporation for the objects and purposes and under the articles following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be Southern Industrial and Burial Association, and by its corporate name it shall have the power and authority to have and enjoy succession for a period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof, to contract, sue and be sued, to make, have and use a corporate seal and the same to change or alter at pleasure, to hold, receive, lease, purchase, convey, pledge, mortgage or exchange property, both real and personal, to name and appoint such managers, directors, officers and agents as it may see fit, and in the convenience of the corporation may require, and to make and establish such by-laws for the management and regulation of its affairs and business as may be necessary and proper and the same to alter or change at pleasure.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation shall be in the town of Covington, State of Louisiana, and all citation or other legal process shall be served on the president, or in his absence on the vice president.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and carried on, shall be hereby declared to be: That form of mutual association or mutual assistance life insurance business known as Industrial Life Insurance, for which stipulated premiums, advance assessment and dues are regularly payable and collectable at any stated term less than a month apart, and for which additional assessments may be levied as may become necessary and the policies are benefit certificates or which are for sums of five hundred dollars, or less, on a single life, or which policies or benefit certificates provide a weekly cash benefit for accident, caused by sickness or accident, of twenty dollars per week or less, or which provides for the attendance of a physician or supplying of drugs, or furnishing a funeral.

ARTICLE IV. All the corporate power of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors to be composed of three members, two of said Directors shall constitute a quorum, all of whom shall be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of Louisiana, and as the holder of a policy or benefit certificate in this Association, they shall hold office for five years or until their successors are elected and qualified and shall be elected at a meeting called for that purpose by ballot of the holders of this corporation, each holder of a certificate being entitled to one vote, either in person or by written proxy, the first election to be held on the second Monday of December, 1920, and every five years thereafter. The Board of Directors shall hold monthly meetings, and shall from among their number choose annually a president, a vice president and a secretary treasurer, in person or by proxy at each meeting, and in the event of dissolution the affairs of this Association shall be liquidated by two commissioners to be elected at the meeting which decided to liquidate by a vote of the policy holders or benefit certificate holders all meetings of the members of this Association shall be held at the domicile of the Association after ten days notice by publication in one of the daily newspapers in the English language in the town of Covington, and at such meetings each holder of a policy or benefit certificate shall be entitled to one vote in person or written proxy.

ARTICLE V. No members of this Association shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of this Association, in any further sum than the unpaid balance due on his policy or benefit certificate, and under his contract, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or exposing a member of this Association to any liability beyond any unpaid balance due by him.

Be it further ordained etc., that all the acts of this police jury not in conflict with this ordinance relative to the advertisement and acceptance of the bid of said Henry Keller and the authorization of this police jury to enter into said contract with said Henry Keller, be and the same are hereby approved, ratified and confirmed.

Section 3. Be it further ordained and re-acted, said ordinance adopted by this body on the 17th day of November, 1915, providing for the maintenance, repair and upkeep of the public highways of St. Tammany parish by a contract, be and the same is hereby approved and promulgated.

AMENDMENT TO CHARTER OF THE ST. TAMMANY BANKING CO. & SAVINGS BANK.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it known that on this 10th day of December, A. D., 1915, before me, Karl J. Kohnke, a Notary Public, within and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally came and appeared Clarence E. Schonberg and Jacob Seiler, residents of said parish, and me personally known, who declared that the said Clarence E. Schonberg was chairman and the said Jacob Seiler was the secretary of a meeting of the stockholders of the St. Tammany Banking Co. & Savings Bank held at the office of said Banking Company at Covington, Louisiana, the domicile of said corporation, on the 6th day of December, 1915, pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors of said corporation on October 21, 1915, calling said meeting, and after due notice having been given by the stockholders of said corporation by thirty days publication in the St. Tammany Farmer, a weekly newspaper published in the town of Covington, La., in accordance with the charter of said corporation, and that at said meeting there were a total of three hundred and sixty-two (362) out of five hundred (500) shares present or represented by written proxy.

And appeared and declared that at such meeting of such stockholders a resolution was adopted by the unanimous vote of all the stockholders present and represented, that Article I and II of the Articles of Incorporation of said corporation should be amended, and said Articles were duly amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be St. Tammany Bank & Trust Company, and its domicile is hereby declared to be and is established in the town of Covington, Louisiana.

It shall have and use a corporate seal, circular in form and containing the inscription "St. Tammany Bank & Trust Company, Covington, La.," which seal may be altered or changed at the pleasure of the Board of Directors of this corporation.

The President or in his absence or inability, the First Vice President, or in the absence or inability of both, the Cashier of said bank, is hereby designated as the officer upon whom citation or other legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE II. The purpose for which this corporation is organized, the nature of its business, and the power and authority it shall exercise, are hereby declared to be: To receive money deposited and to pay the same in current funds, or to deposit and to discount, buy and sell promissory notes and bills of exchange and other evidences of debt; to buy, hold and sell stocks, bonds, gold and silver bullion and foreign coin; to receive securities and valuables for safe keeping on such terms as may be agreed upon; to hold, receive, lease, pledge and convey personal property, both for its own use and benefit, and also as agent and trustee; to acquire, hold and convey real estate for the purpose and objects expressly allowed by law, and subject to the limitations imposed by law; to lend money on personal, or other legal security, at legal rates of interest; to accept and execute trusts or agencies of any kind and every description, which may be committed or transferred with its consent to it by any person or persons, corporation, board or body, public or private, whomsoever, or by any court of the State of Louisiana, or of the United States; or of any one of the United States; to act as executor, administrator, syndic, receiver, curator, tutor, trustee or assignee, in the same manner and to the same extent and under the same conditions that natural persons may be so appointed, all in accordance with law; and to exercise all powers necessary or incidental to the business of banking, including the right to have a separate and special savings department, and in such department to pay such interest on deposits and at such times as may hereafter be

determined by the Board of Directors, according to law. And said appellants declared that they were authorized and instructed by said stockholders' meeting to execute the proper notarial act amending the charter of said corporation in accordance with the said vote of said stockholders.

And said appellants thereupon declared that the Articles of Incorporation of said St. Tammany Banking Co. & Savings Bank have been duly and legally amended by the vote of the stockholders of said corporation, and they make this declaration and execute this notarial act in accordance therewith.
