WHY YOU SHOULD NOT VOTE FOR PARKER. Official Vote in Primary. City County Total Pleasant 29,557 24,850 84,467 Barrett 3,758 26,854 30,612 Pleasant's total majority, 114,519. Eligible vote April 18, about 145,000.

Section 27 of the Primary Election Law of this State, reads as follows: "Be it further enacted, etc., That no one who participates in the primary election of any political party, shall have the right to participate in any primary election of any other political party, with a view of nominating opposing candidates, nor shall be permitted to sign any nomination papers for any opposing candidate or candidate, nor shall he be permitted to be himself a candidate in opposition to any one nominated at or through primary election in which he took part."

No man who participated in the recent Democratic primary has a moral right to vote for any candidate at the general election to be held on April 18, 1916, other than the Democratic nominees.

The Times-Picayune of January 25, 1916, in an editorial says: "We do not believe it fair or honest to enter the primary and vote for one of the two candidates for the gubernatorial nomination with the intention of voting in the general election against the nominee. There will be some who do so, BUT WE DO NOT BELIEVE THAT ANY WORTHY CITIZEN WILL BE GUILTY OF THE DOUBLE-DEALING OF VOTING FOR A MAN THEY DO NOT MEAN TO SUPPORT. This cannot fail to degrade politics, whereas what we most in Louisiana is to elevate and purify them. Honesty is the best policy in politics as in business; and not only the best policy but the only honorable course."

Parker's Political Record. 1896—Charged with voting for Pharr; never denied charge. 1899—Middle-of-roader in city fight; proposed ticket to be voted which was part "regular" and part "Jacksonian."

1904—Attended his first "ring" convention, at which his brother was nominated for district attorney; couldn't vote because he was a squaw man; was absolutely silent during the great civic upheaval that followed.

1908—Voted open ticket for Taft, Republican nominee for president and violated the law in exposing his ballot.

1912—Flopped back to Democracy, led and won fight for Governor H. in the same year between the state and city elections, the deserted Governor Hall and Democracy and joined Roosevelt and registered as a Progressive; league defeat resulted.

1916—Progressive candidate for governor of the State of Louisiana, supported by Republicans.
