### MEDICAL ADVISER WRITES ON EQUAL SUFFRAGE AND HEALTH.

"Health and the Woman Movement" is the title of a little book of 48 pages by Dr. Clelia Duval Mosher, medical adviser to women at the Leelanau Stanford Junior University in California. It is vital and thorough in its key to health for women. We want to see a copy of it in the hands of every girl in an office, in the home in school, in college and in factories. Wise and economic employers of girls and women will do well to put it into their hands.

The following quotation from the book gives an idea of character:

Setting aside the women who have organic disease, what classes do we find escape the disturbances of the menopause and climacteric? The answer may be given without fear of

contradiction: those who are busy and useful. The women who have absorbing occupations, who are vitally necessary in the world, are the ones who get through this period unharmed.

A prominent woman physician in the east declared a few years ago that not a single woman physician of her acquaintance had gone to pieces at the change of life. Among a considerable number of women who are teachers or authors or (in some cases) have carried the burden of being the mother of a family while occupying a salaried position throughout the menopause, not one has had to quit work for this cause while four have certified that their research work which has brought them distinction was done without any inconvenience whatever during years of this functional change. Whatever may be one's personal opinion of the advantages or disadvantages of woman suffrage, like many of the economic and philanthropic opportunities now open to women, helps to meet this problem of the hygiene of middle life. During the years of a woman's necessary total absorption in her occupation of home making and the bearing and rearing of her children, her intellectual occupations and interests outside of the home are laid aside. Where equal suffrage exists civic matters become a topic of home discussion; they concern the mother and daughters as well as the father and sons. Thus a passive interest in politics is kept alive in the woman during her years of total absorption in her family and home. When the period of leisure arrives, it is not necessary to try to manufacture an interest for the woman who has occupied, as has been shown above, her time in the normal course of events being taken away from her. Thus "vote for women" becomes not only a safeguard to the woman of middle age a help in preserving the integrity of the family, but a protection to the community from the uncultured aged woman. It becomes economically an asset in the productive use of the force and intelligence otherwise wasted in doctor's bills, sanatorium treatment, or too often expended in

dangerous fads.

According to announcements from the American Society for the Control of Cancer, measures adopted in Portsmouth, England, for public education on the subject of cancer are already taking effect. These measures were adopted in 1913. In that year there were recorded 230 deaths from this disease in the city. The annual report for the year 1914 just published states that there were only 197 deaths during the year. This decrease is regarded by the state sanitary authorities as justifying their efforts to reduce the death rate from cancer by urging early treatment. The methods adopted include the monthly publication of articles in local newspapers; printing and distributing of a circular by the health department; lectures to midwives, nurses and social workers in the city, and provision by the health department for free microscopic examinations and reports of suspected growths to aid physicians in diagnosis.

### BALLOT IN EGYPT SOON, SAYS RULER.

Women may vote in Egypt before they do in some of the United States if the prediction of the Sultan, Hussein Kemal, comes true. According to this prophet: "One of the greatest results of the war to the Orient will be the complete emancipation of women. Orientals understand so little the great part women play in the world's progress; woman should be given the opportunity of developing and educating herself in the highest degree."

### SOCIAL SERVICE ITEMS.

Public Comfort, a National League for Instance for Proper Provision for the Common Decencies of Life, is being promoted by Cressy L. Wilbur of the State Health Department, Albany, N. Y. A membership card is sent on receipt of a postal card request. There are no dues or duties. What apparently marks an impor-

tant change of policy on the part of the Turkish government in respect to war relief within Turkish territory is outlined in a cable recently received from Constantinople by the American Red Cross. This message declares that the Turkish government "authorizes American Red Cross, co-operating with Red Cross, to conduct relief work for civilians of all races."

The message declares that there is great suffering throughout the country, particularly at Constantinople and suburbs along the shores of the Bosphorus, at Adrianople, Brusa and Smyrna. Five hundred thousand persons, not comprising Armenian refugees, are said to need bread. Heretofore, since the outbreak of the war, the Turkish government has declined to permit any foreign agency to undertake the distribution of relief within Turkish territory.

### DANCING SCHOOL NOTES.

Miss Olga Peters opened the summer session of the M. C. B. Dancing School last Saturday, May 13th, with a class of twenty-one pupils. Miss Peters was very much encouraged by the enthusiasm of the children and the spirit with which they all entered into the work.

The legs and arm movements which the classes are being given are invaluable as exercises not to speak of the benefits derived from them as an aid in dancing. Miss Peters takes each child individually for the new steps and exercises and then the class as a whole, so that no time is neglected. Mothers of children are especially invited to attend some of the classes to get an idea of the beautiful work that is being done.

Today, as every Saturday, the junior class comes at three and the senior class at four-thirty. The terms are one dollar a month paid in advance.

### THE EDUCATIONAL BUILDING.

(By Mrs. J. C. Burns) The interest shown by the women of the parish to promote the idea of an educational building at the parish

fair grounds is growing. In the past week a liberal donation of \$10 was handed to Mrs. J. C. Burns by Mrs. L. F. Hadden, of New Orleans and Covington. Knowing the interest Mrs. Hadden always takes in the civic welfare and uplift of Covington, this was not a surprise. It certainly was appreciated. Just after this donation another was received from the splendid school workers of Abita.

At a called meeting of the School League of Abita Springs, this small but energetic band of women who have worked bravely and untiringly to raise funds to keep their school open and provide necessities, voted to give ten dollars of their fund to help build an educational building. They anticipate working right along to help with a Woman's Building. This is the spirit that builds a nation—energy, co-operation, civic pride and friendship.

Abita has shown its willingness always to assist in the upbuilding of our parish and the committee in charge of the educational work wishes to express their sincere appreciation. Having received the generous help of our two nearest towns, Madisonville, who is always a co-worker for the good of our parish and who has sent twenty dollars for the educational building and ten dollars for the woman's building. The several private donations from Shidell and Covington for the educational building and the generous five dollars sent by the Daughters of Isabella as the initial deposit for the woman's building, we feel sure that our fondest hopes will be realized.

Our young friend, Senator Delos R. Johnson, of Washington parish, a young man of rare ability and great promise, shown by the following bill introduced last Tuesday morning in the Senate, that he is a wise advocate of woman's rights. He does not use the word "suffrage," but his amendment providing for so many important offices for women is conclusive that he believes in our wisdom and strength. The dispatch follows: Baton Rouge, May 16.—Governor Pleasant's campaign statement of his

willingness for women to see the public boards transacting business interest to women, was reflected in joint resolution introduced in the senate Tuesday morning by Senator Delos R. Johnson.

The Johnson resolution providing for amendment of the constitution so that "resident women over the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible to hold the office of factory inspector, notary public, and any other connected with the educational, eleemosynary, penal and correctional systems of the state, parish, ward, municipality, or any other political division of the state."
