Twenty thousand women gathered in New York last week, at the Biennial of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. They came from every corner of the United States.

At the Biennials of the General Federation, the rise of the suffrage opinion among women has been shown as in a barometer. For many years the subject was tabooed. Then the effort to secure endorsement began. At first it was prevented with ease; then with more and more difficulty; and finally, at the Biennial in Chicago two years ago, the rising tide swept all barriers away, and the suffrage resolution was passed by an overwhelming majority. Like resolutions have been adopted also by the State Federations of 33 states more than two-thirds of the whole number—and the list is constantly lengthening.

VEILS GOING, ALSO HAREM MYSTERY.

"The emancipation of women in Turkey has made remarkable progress since the beginning of the war," says the Boston Globe, basing its statement on correspondence from Constantinople appearing in the German newspapers. "In the best society in Constantinople the women no longer wear their veils when receiving their guests. Though veils continue to be worn by the Turkish women on the streets, the fashion has made them so flimsy and transparent that they might just as well be dispensed with.

"Consequently all the fascination and mystery that heretofore have surrounded the harem has suddenly disappeared and in their place there is simply the usual family life. The Turkish woman is as much a house wife as her European sister, and in this war her resources have been taxed to the utmost."

IRVIN COBB SAYS WAR WON HIM.

Irvin S. Cobb, the well known humorist and war correspondent, recently told how he plunged into the European imbroglio a "passive" suffragist and emerged an "active" one. The sight of women suffering, as he passed through the war-ridden countries, effected the transformation.

"I saw them standing before the bulletin boards," said the war correspondent, "watching as the list of the names of the dead was posted up. I saw them read, cry out once and go away weeping.

"I saw widows with little children they came out of the villages and the cities, and sought the cemeteries. The men they mourned were no buried there. Perhaps they lay in rough trenches, far away on battlefields already old. But these weeping women went to the cemeteries with their memories.

"I saw women in rude hospitals at the front. They performed the most repulsive tasks in the most heroic manner.

"Then I realized that the burden of war lies with the women. Not the burden of sorrow alone; but the economic burden which remains with them long after a war has passed. I realized that in countries that have representative governments the women should have a voice in choosing those men who decide if there is to be war.

"I used to say I could see no reason why women should have the vote," continued the writer. "At the same time I admitted that I could see no real reason against their having the vote if they want it. In a word, I was a 'passive' suffragist.

PIONEER SOCIETY WITH A NEW PROGRAM.

Eleven years ago Dr. Prince A. Morrow founded the first society in this country for the spread of sex education, or sex hygiene as it was then called. He and his associates were criticized and ridiculed. But public opinion has changed. Societies for sex education exist everywhere. In 1913 the American Federation for Sex Hygiene combined with the American Vigilance Association and formed the American Social Hygiene Association, which has since waged a nation-wide campaign for more light on sex matters against silence was made last year when the society founded by Dr. Morrow outlined an enlarged program for the coming year. It changed its name from the New York Society of Sanitary and Moral Propriety to the New York Social Hygiene Society. Then it name definite things that it hopes to accomplish.

"Our work will be twofold," said Mrs. Frederick H. Whitin, who has been executive secretary of the society for three years. "One will be the public health aspect, the other educational. The public health work will be directed at the care and treatment of venereal disease. First we want to reorganize and standardize the clinics for the treatment of venereal disease. Out of 27 clinics visited last year only seven could be approved.

ed. Again we want to secure the establishment of pay clinics. These are vitally necessary for the man of moderate income goes today chiefly to the quack. We want to replace the quack with the pay clinic.

"We intend also to try to strengthen the educational and follow-up work of the clinics. There should be social service work in connection with every venereal disease clinic. If cures are to be effective, the patients must be followed up and induced to come back to the clinic repeatedly. Moreover, if a man is married, his wife should be subject to inspection. If the wife is infected, the children ought to be examined. All this means continuous and tactful visiting by a trained social service worker with a trained social service worker.

"Why should not the question of venereal disease be considered in paroling or release of women prisoners? If such prisoners are in a contagious state, perhaps they ought not to be paroled. If they are diseased but not contagious they ought to be reported periodically to the paroling authorities until cured.

"On the educational side our object is the wider presentation of social hygiene before the schools, the churches, the forums and the homes of the city.

"We shall lay stress also upon campaign for further legislation. Part of this will be in the direction of controlling venereal quack advertising."

 6. Avoid overeating and over weight.
 7. Eat sparingly of meat and eggs.
 8. Eat some hard, some bulky, and some raw foods.
 9. Eat slowly.
- III—POISONS:
 10. Evacuate thoroughly, and frequently.
 11. Stand, sit and walk erect.
 12. Do not allow poison and tions to enter the body.
 13. Keep the teeth, tongue clean.
- IV—ACTIVITY:
 14. Work, play, rest in moderation.
 15. Keep serene.



FOURTH CLASS POSTMASTER EXAMINATION.
To Be Held Saturday, July 8, at Bogalusa, La., for Postmaster at Sun, La.
The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on the date named above an examination will be held at Bogalusa, La., as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of 4th class postmaster at Sun, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office. Unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office is \$453 for the last fiscal year.
Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 18 years, women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.
Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.
The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.
Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Sun, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.
Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington at least 7 days before the date of the examination otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.
