PROCLAMATION.
Pursuant to a resolution by the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, at its adjourned meeting held on the 8th day of June, 1916, N. H. FitzSimons, president of the Parish Board of School Directors, hereby give notice that, in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in School District No. 9, parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on the 11th day of July, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition to-wit:
To levy a special tax of two and one-half mills on the dollar on all the property in School District No. 9, parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to Stat taxation, annually, for the period of two years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools; that is, for the purpose of paying teachers' salaries for the public schools of said District No. 9.
For the purposes of said special election the polling places will be the Town Hall in the town of Slidell and the following commissioners and clerk of election have been appointed to serve at this election, all of whom will serve without compensation: F. A. Bourgeois, J. F. Polk
