SWEET POTATOE, HOW TO GROW, THE BEST VARIETY TO CAN, ETC.

In the sandy loam soil of St. Tammany we have one of the best conditions possible for the production of high grade sweet potatoes. Our sweets have a better flavor than those grown in the lime rock regions. The soil does not become so compact around the potato in the growing season, which gives the tuber more room for formation of starch cells without which the potato would be worthless. I do not see why more attention has not been given this crop in St. Tammany parish than has been heretofore. They are the easiest crop to grow and at the same time we have a longer planting season, more time to go on than many other crops. We can start planting out draws in April and wind up with vines or cuttings in the first part of July. We have about four months to go on planting the crop. As a rule heavy fertilizing is not necessary to produce a paying crop. Two to four hundred pounds of mixture of cotton seed meal and bone meal is sufficient. The mixture should be made by taking two hundred pounds of bone meal and one hundred pounds of cotton seed meal. As much of this can be used to the acre as desired.

Every farmer who is a successful potato grower knows that the soil should be put in good condition before planting. He knows that every time the land is plowed before planting puts more potatoes in the ground and less work to be done after the plants have been set. The land should be plowed in fall or winter and replowed about twice in early spring, then the cultivator can be used to keep the land free from grass and weeds until planted. In this way one or two cultivations will be sufficient to make a full crop of potatoes. The work has been done before the planting and naturally does not require as much work as the man who goes ahead and sets out his plants in a bed of clods with a pretty good coat of grass and weeds scattered among them.

The St. Tammany Canning Co., of Covington, is very anxious to contract with farmers for their crop of sweet potatoes. This is a home concern and trying to do business, and it is the farmers' duty to help the company out from a patriotic standpoint as well as a money proposition. The company will be only too glad to take up the matter with any one who is interested in growing potatoes for canning purposes.

The trade demands a yellow potato for canning, and any one who might think of growing potatoes for canning purposes will bear this in mind. The "Nancy Hall" and "Porto Rico" are good varieties. CLUB WORK.

According to the Department the bankers of many states are realizing the importance of pig club work as a means of materially improving rural conditions. We know one thing and that fact cannot be denied, and that is that a farmer who has fat hogs of good blood, good cattle and plenty to feed them on produced on his farm, will never starve. Neither does he care anything about the high cost of living. The object of the boys' pig club is to better distribute blooded hogs over the country and at the same time encourage farmers to grow more feed crops for hogs. The boys grow up with the knowledge of pig feeding that they would have never gotten had they not been members of the boys' pig clubs.

The banks of St. Tammany are no behind in this good work. As I have said before, they offer to help any worthy boy, on my recommendation to get one or a pair of pigs and start him in the business. I have placed some eight head during the last few weeks, but that is not good enough. I should have placed fifty head. Let more boys join us in this club and get started out in the "hog world" with a safe foundation, one that will be sure to make money for you if you give the pig proper attention.

CHARTER of the POOLE AND STANGA UNDERTAKING COMPANY, INC. STATE OF LOUISIANA, Parish of St. Tammany.

Before me, Adrian D. Schwartz, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the Parish and State, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons who are hereto subscribed, residents of this State who severally declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of the Legislature of this State, known as Act 267 of 1914, they do by these presents agree and bind themselves as well as all other such persons a may hereafter become associated with them, in order to form and constitute a corporation for the objects and purposes hereinafter set forth and under the following conditions: to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be The Poole and Stanga Undertaking Company, (Inc.); and it shall enjoy all rights, privileges, and immunities guaranteed to corporations under the law.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation shall be Covington, Louisiana, where all service of legal process shall be made, according to laws now, or which may hereafter be established relative to the service of citation or other legal process on corporations.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be: a general undertaking, embalming, garage, and livery business and to that end it may acquire by purchase or otherwise in any manner of real or personal property, and the same to mortgage, pledge, or lease according to law; and so to do all things necessary or incidental to the purposes aforesaid.

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby declared to be fixed at the sum of \$5,000, divided into shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, and this corporation shall be operative and go into business when fifty per cent of the said amount shall have been subscribed and paid for. No transfer of stock shall be binding upon this corporation unless same appears upon the books thereof. No stockholder shall have the right to assign or transfer any share or shares held by him, unless he shall have first tendered same in writing to the Board of Directors.
