**NOTED ARCHITECT DIES IN ROCHESTER.**

**W. H. Prague, Native of New Orleans, Expires Suddenly Following An Operation.**

News was received by Mrs. W. C. Williams, Monday, of the death of her brother, Wm. H. Prague, in Rochester, N. Y. Mr. Prague was a resident of New York, but was in Rochester on a business trip at the time of his sudden death.

Mr. Prague was a native of New Orleans, and a resident here for many years. He was the son of the late James B. Prague and Maria F. Watkins. Thirty years ago he went to New York city and engaged in architecture and contracting, following his father's profession. He was one of the best known architects of New York city and had in charge many of the famous structures of that great city, among them being the Singer and the Woolworth buildings. While in Rochester, he was stricken with appendicitis and died following the operation.  
 He is survived by widow and two daughters besides his mother, his three sisters, and a brother, E. Lancaster Prague. The late Sidney W. Prague, also a brother, was formerly of Covington, La.

**ORDINANCES.**

**AN ORDINANCE**

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, That in accordance with Act No. 227 of 1914 and section 2 of the constitution of 1913, that there is hereby created what shall be known as Drainage District No. 1, situated in the parish of St. Tammany. The purpose and object of this Drainage District shall be for the reclamation and drainage of the following described property, to-wit:

Belonging to George Koepf, Sr.—All section 23.

Belonging to George H. Koepf—Beginning at the southwest corner of northwest quarter section 32 of 1760' n, 2640' w, 1760' south to point of beginning. Containing 105 acres.

Belonging to Edward Koepf—Beginning at a stake set on section line of 33 which stake is 1760' east of northwest corner section 33, thence 3. 1760' s, 2640' w, 1760' n 2640' to point of beginning. Containing 105 acres.



An ordinance to levy and collect a tax on dogs throughout the Parish of St. Tammany.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, that there shall be levied each year for the benefit of the public schools of this Parish an annual license tax of \$2.00 per head on all dogs throughout the parish.

empowered and instructed to collect the said tax from the owner or owners of any dog or dogs in the parish, and that his fee shall be fixed at 25 per cent of the amounts collected and to that end he may designate such person or persons as he may see fit to collect the said license throughout the respective wards of the parish.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the said license tax collector shall notify all delinquent dog owners in writing, and require of them the amount due for dog license, for each year hereafter, and that after ten days written notice to the said owner or owners, it shall be lawful, and said collector for dog license, or any deputy sheriff, constable, or deputy constable, shall be empowered, and they are hereby instructed to destroy any dog which shall be found at large, whose owner has not protected it with license required by this ordinance.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the president of the police jury be, and he is hereby authorized to purchase such tags as shall be necessary for the purpose of issuing the proper license to the owners of dogs.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person or persons interfering in any manner with any officer charged with the execution of this ordinance are hereby declared to be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to suffer a fine in the sum not to exceed \$25.00, or imprisonment in the parish jail for a period not exceeding 30 days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That all the licenses and penalties collected under this act for the benefit of the public schools as herein provided, shall be appropriated by the school board to the use of the schools of each ward, according to the licenses and penalties realized from their respective sections.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances to the contrary notwithstanding are hereby repealed.
