THE MAN WITH THE SILLO WINS.

Up to date this has been one of the worst seasons for saving fodder and hay in the memory of our oldest citizens. It has been a matter of impossibility to sun-dry hay of any kind, due to excessive moisture conditions. The man who has a silo on his farm, however, did not mind the rain, as he silks for the corn or sorghum to be good and wet when it goes to the cutter. The water makes the ensilage keep better and the cattle seem to relish it more. The farmer does not need an expensive cutter nor a large silo. The whole outfit is in reach, as far as expense goes, of every farmer in St. Tammany parish, and no man with as many as 15 head of cattle and horses should be without one. In the first place a silo will pay for itself in two seasons by the labor saved, not mentioning the saving in crop and feed. Silage furnishes a constant supply of succulent food for the stock when most needed in winter and will do more to keep the plow horses and mules in good condition in early spring when good plowing should be done than any patented medicine known. It will put more milk and butter in your pail when fed with other stuff than all other kinds of mixed feed. It will put more good tender beef on your steers than any other feed known and the butchers know it. They would willingly pay a higher price for such meat, if they could get it in early spring when good fat steers are scarce. An acre of land that would make 25 bushels of corn would make five tons of silage which would be sufficient feed for three horses of cows for a period of two months. By feeding some dry hay or other roughage an acre would feed longer or almost through the winter. Too long have we labored to make a crop of corn and then throw away about



so into full details but will be only too glad to take up the matter with any one and show how the silo can be built very cheaply—if necessary get the State man to come over here and spend a day or so in properly carrying the silo up. Write me if interested in building a silo.

Some few weeks ago we told in the columns of this paper about a good club rally we had here at Covington of the corn, tomato, pig and poultry club members of the parish. We told you we would show you the picture of this happy bunch of people—and here it is. Don't they all look fat and mazy? SCHOOL BOARD.

Covington, La., Aug. 16, 1916.
In accordance with resolution of the School Board of St. Tammany parish adopted July 12, 1915, the board met in special session for the purpose of counting the returns of the special election held in School District No. 10 of the parish of St. Tammany on the 15th day of August, 1916.

The following members were present: Geo. R. Dutsch, T. J. O'Keefe, N. H. Fitzsimons, W. H. Kahl, H. Q. Parker, C. F. Farmer, T. P. Crawford, G. E. Millar. Absent: Chas. B. Wills and C. M. Liddle.

A quorum was present. The following resolution was introduced by G. E. Millar who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Geo. R. Dutsch:

Whereas, in the opinion of this board it is necessary and advisable that a special election be ordered to be held in School District No. 10 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., at which time there shall be submitted the following two propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of three mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 10 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to state taxation annually, for a period of ten years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of the said School District No. 10.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to run not longer than ten (10) years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building in District No. 10 and purchasing a site if necessary for said school building, within said school district, title to which shall vest in the public.

Be it resolved by the St. Tammany Parish School Board of the parish of St. Tammany, La., in legal session convened, as follows:

Section 1. That a special election be and the same is ordered to be held in School District No. 10 in the parish of St. Tammany, La., on Tuesday, the 19th day of September, 1916, at which time there shall be submitted the following two propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of three mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 10 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to state taxation, annually, for a period of ten years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of the said School District No. 10.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to run not longer than 20 years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building in District No. 10, and purchasing a site, if necessary, for said school building within said school district title to which shall vest in the public.

Section 2. That the secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election a sufficient number of ballots on each of which shall be printed all of the propositions mentioned in section one of this resolution arranged in such manner as to enable the voters to vote on each one separately and in the following form:


Proposition No. 1.

Proposition No. 2.
To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars to run not longer than twenty years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building in District No. 10, and purchasing a site, if necessary, for said school building within said school district, title to which shall vest in the public.

For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be the usual polling place in the town of Abita Springs, La., and Robt. Abney, T. L. Beaudouan and E. J. Terreboune have been appointed Commissioners, and A. O. Pons, clerk of election to serve at the regular polling place in Abita Springs, La.
