COVINGTON-SLIDELL ROAD.

The Covington-Slidell road is finished. It cost the parish \$40,000 and the State \$19,500. The contractor, W. W. Powell, lost \$6000 in cash on the contract, and virtually worked fifteen months for nothing. So the cost of the road was \$65,000 while the cost to the parish was only \$40,700. Pretty cheap road.
