Rice Propaganda to Nationalize Southern Food.

(Special Correspondence)
New Orleans, January 4, 1917.
Reports from various sections of the Rice Belt indicate a substantial response to the plan of rice growers and millers to create a fund of \$50,000 to \$75,000 a year, for three or more years, to nationally advertise rice as a standard food. It is likely the rice leaders will meet in Beaumont early in January to perfect the organization of a separate association whose sole purpose will be to put rice on the daily tables of the American public. The New Orleans Times-Picayune in discussing the Gulf Coast oyster industry, pointing out the cheapness of oysters and its value as a food, takes occasion to commend this other Gulf Coast product and said: "Another Louisiana and Texas product, rice, can claim the same advantage of remaining practically unchanged in

It is this fact that is so largely responsible for the present movement to nationally popularize rice and it is generally agreed that the time is opportune for carrying out this ambitious program.

High School State Athletic League Organized.

The re-organization of the Louisiana State High School Athletic Association at the Hotel Grunewald, New Orleans, has given an impetus to school attendance in a manner which appeals strongly to the youthful mind. That athletics and education are close companions no observer of modern methods doubts for a moment and is axiomatic that the most successful educational institutions are those having the best athletic teams.

Southwestern Industrial Institute at Lafayette is a conspicuous example. During the last season their football team defeated all comers in their class and made Southwestern the state champion. President Edwin L. Stephens is a modern university president and his encouragement of athletics has had a great and remarkable development of this state institution. Owing to athletic success high school boys of the state who want an industrial and agricultural education are flocking to Lafayette just as athletes who are ambitious for athletics and education gravitate to Yale, Harvard or Princeton, where they can get both under the most favorable conditions.

Gulf Coast League Begins Active Work.

Announcement was made at Mobile that active work of the Gulf Coast Development League, suspended during the holidays, will be taken up immediately after New Year's with the intention to complete the campaign in sixty days. Contract for the big five years program of advertising and exploiting the Gulf Coast country for settlement and development and for wealthy tourists, has been awarded the Thomson-Bryan-Elis Company of Washington, Baltimore and New York. John A. Fox is in charge and associated with him is Dr. W. H. Taylor of Mobile, secretary of the League, officially representing the organization. President Henry Hall, who is president of the First National Bank of Mobile, is active in the movement and has enlisted the financial co-operation of other leading bankers and large cut-over land owners in the Gulf Coast country.

Coincident with the Gulf Coast movement the announcement is made that the Mexican Gulf Hotel at Pass Christian has been completely remodelled and that R. Frank Taylor, lately of the St. Charles Hotel, New Orleans, has been placed in charge and will open this famous resort with its golf course, about the middle of January. A. Aschaffenburg and Arthur B. Lacour, of New Orleans, who have taken a leading part in the Gulf Coast movement, are the new owners of the Mexican Gulf Hotel.
