passing of some law for this purpose.

Alderman A. R. Smith—

"There is no doubt that there is danger in allowing consumptives to mingle freely with guests of boarding houses without sanitary precautions. I am in favor of such restrictions as may be necessary to segregate them and limit as far as possible the danger of contagion, and will vote for the passage of laws to that effect."

Alderman J. E. Nelson—

"You may say that I am in favor of the passing of laws that will keep consumptives from mixing generally with the guests at various boarding houses, and if the license system will do this, then I am in favor of it. At all events some restrictive law should be passed."

Alderman B. I. Addison—

"I am unhesitatingly in favor of putting consumptives under control. The situation demands attention, and I am in favor of doing something that will give citizens and visitors more security."

Alderman Emile Frederick—

"Won't that drive people away? I can't answer you now. I will let you know about 9:30 in the morning."

stated that he did not fully understand the proposition and wanted more information. When it was explained to him further, he said:

"I guess that's all right. I'd be willing to vote for it. But it will be a question for the town attorney to decide whether we can pass such a law or not. It looks all right to me."

His final statement makes the council unanimously in favor of passing laws that will help the situation. If the town is not empowered, under its charter, to police the town or to pass laws for its protection from infectious diseases, then it is time we got a new charter.

CHARTER of the PEARL RIVER VENEER COMPANY, INC.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans.

Be it known that on this second day of the month of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, before me, John R. Upton, a Notary Public in and for the City and Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, therein residing, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned,

Personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared to me, Notary, that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this state relative to the organization of corporations, and more especially of Act 267 of 1914, they have covenanted and agreed, and by these presents do covenant and agree for themselves, their successors and assigns, to form themselves into a corporation and body politic, for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations hereinafter set forth, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be the Pearl River Veneer Company, Inc., and under such title it shall have and enjoy succession and existence for a period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof unless sooner dissolved; it shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, the same to break and alter at pleasure; to have, hold, buy, sell, lease, mortgage, hypothecate or pledge property, real, personal or mixed, necessary, proper or incidental for the carrying on of its business, as well as to issue bonds secured by such mortgages; to make and issue notes and other certificates of indebtedness; to name, elect and appoint managers, directors, clerks or other agents, direct or indirect, to conduct its corporate business, and to make such by-laws, rules and regulations as may be necessary or found desirable for the management of the business and affairs of this corporation and generally to do every other act, matter or thing necessary or desirable for the complete and proper carrying out of said business.

ARTICLE II.
The domicile of this corporation shall be at Pearl River, in the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, where all citations or other legal process shall be served upon the president, or in his absence on the vice-president, or in the absence of both upon the secretary.

ARTICLE III.
The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared and stated to be to manufacture, buy and sell veneer, lumber, shingles, timber, logs, box shooks and wood packages of all kinds, and all other timber products, for either domestic sale or export; and to that end, to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire and operate veneer mills, box factories and sawmills in the State of Louisiana and elsewhere; to construct, acquire and use railroads, tramways and other roads or rights of way for the transportation of veneer, boxes, shooks, lumber, timber, logs, and other products; to buy, lease or otherwise acquire timber lands and timber rights on land, and to acquire, lease, hold and buy lands for the use of sawmills and factories and timber yards, in the State of Louisiana, or elsewhere; to acquire by purchase, lease or otherwise, patents or inventions that might be used for the purposes of the business of this corporation; and generally to do and perform any and all things necessary or convenient to carry on said objects and purposes.

ARTICLE IV.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty thousand (\$20,000) Dollars, divided into Two Hundred (200) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, provided that the amount to which the

capital stock of this corporation may be increased shall be Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars.

One Hundred (100) shares, or Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars of the capital stock of this corporation must be subscribed before the filing of the article of incorporation. The subscribed capital stock of this corporation shall be payable in cash, property (real or personal), or for labor and services rendered and performed.

No stockholder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the faults, contracts or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares of stock subscribed by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, or of exposing any shareholder to any liability whatsoever.

This corporation shall not engage in business until One Hundred (100) shares, or Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars of the capital stock shall have been issued and paid in, in cash. If, in addition, any stock of this corporation is exchanged, either in whole or in part for property or good will, in that event the provisions of Section 3 of Act 267 of 1914 shall be complied with strictly.

ARTICLE V.
All the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors to be composed of three stockholders, each of whom shall own in his own right, during his term of office, at least one full paid up share of stock, all of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; provided, the Board of Directors are hereby authorized to increase, in their discretion, the number of Directors to four, in which case three shall constitute a quorum.

The officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, all of whom shall be members of the Board of Directors. The offices of secretary and treasurer may be combined in one and the same person.

The following named persons shall constitute the first Board of Directors, to-wit:
Clement B. Penrose, No. 101 Audubon street, New Orleans, Louisiana; John B. Lionnet, No. 935 Carrollton avenue, New Orleans, Louisiana; Victor B. Macksey, Pearl River, Louisiana, all residents of the State of Louisiana, as above stated, with Clement B. Penrose, president, John B. Lionnet, vice-president, and Victor B. Macksey, secretary-treasurer, and these directors and officers shall hold office until the first Wednesday of January, 1918, or until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Thereafter the directors shall be elected annually on the first Wednesday of January, of each year, all elections of directors shall be by ballot, and each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock standing in his name on the books of this corporation; this vote to be cast in person or by written proxy, and it shall require three-fourths of the stock present or represented to elect.

Failure to hold an election for Directors on the first Wednesday of January, 1918, or annually thereafter, shall not work a forfeiture of this charter, but the old Board of Directors shall remain in office until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

ARTICLE VI.
The Board of Directors shall hold regular meeting at such time as shall be fixed in the by-laws of this corporation. These meetings shall be held at the domicile of the corporation, but the president may call special meetings of the Board of Directors at such times as may seem advisable, and he shall be required to call such special meeting at the request of a member of the Board of Directors. Three days written notice of such special meetings shall be given to the Directors, unless waiver of such notice is signed by the Directors. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors, either from death, resignation or inability to serve, shall be filled by the remaining Board of Directors at its next regular meeting after such vacancy shall have occurred. The first Board of Directors of this corporation shall be required to draft suitable by-laws for the government of this corporation, which may be altered, amended or changed as the exigencies of the case may require.

ARTICLE VII.
The stock of this corporation may be transferred, provided such transfer shall be recorded on the books of this corporation, before it shall be required to recognize the transfer of the new holder of the stock. The total amount of the subscribed stock, as herein set forth, is the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars, or One Hundred (100) shares, which are hereby authorized to be fully paid for and non-assessable, for cash.

In the event that any stockholder desires to sell his stock, or any part thereof, he shall first offer same to the remaining stockholders, in proportion to their respective holdings, at its book value. This offer is to be made to appear by letter addressed to each stockholder at his last known address, giving thirty days option. At the expiration of which time, the said stockholder desiring to dispose of his stock, shall be at liberty to sell at whatever price and to whom he shall please.

ARTICLE VIII.
This charter may be modified or altered, the capital stock thereof increased or decreased, or the corporation may be dissolved with the assent of three-fourths of the capital stock present or represented at any meeting of the stockholders held for that purpose, after prior notice in writing to each stockholder, or mailed to him at his last known post-office address, all in accordance with the terms of Act 267 of 1914.

ARTICLE IX.
At the expiration of this charter or the earlier dissolution of this

The Farm and Its Income.
The writer had a blank some few weeks ago to fill out and on this blank was one question which asked, "What does your community need to make it a better place to live in?" I had to bring into action my every bit of thinking power to decide what to put first, what was needed first and worst. Of course this question was asked from an agricultural standpoint only. I finally answered the question in a way that several items were mentioned in one answer. I knew that one main thing was better live stock and along with live stock we needed better farm fixtures, such as silos, farm implements and barns, hog houses where the fattening hogs would not need to feed in mud knee deep on the corn thrown over the fence by the boy in knee pants or

his papa either. If this parish had as many grade Herefords as it has scrub stock the tax rolls would jump up several thousand dollars. If it had as many Duroc grades and some full bloods mixed in along more dollars would be added to the roll. If every farmer who claims to be a farmer had farm tools to work with instead of small top-line plows the crop yield would jump up and the need oil would be cut down several thousand dollars. This too would help raise the tax rolls from the fact that the income of the farm would be greater and the farmers' profits would be more. Knowing this to be a fact I do not see why we cannot organize a club for the advancement of livestock in St. Tammany. By this club or organization we could get stuff in car lots if we wanted it, and also ship in car lots. It would be an easy matter to get better prices and this being a fact the income of the farm raised to a higher notch on the beam. In this livestock association silos and barns could be pushed to the front in a better way. What we need is organization.

Now that the Federal Loan Bank will soon open its doors and extend a hand of welcome to the deserving, needy farmers we need organization all the more. Several farmers taken together at the same time are much stronger than if every one would make an effort at the same goal singly. By buying seed of good quality in lots, commercial fertilizers, etc., money would be saved and the farm income raised. I know from my observation that no less than fifteen thousand dollars are wasted every year in this parish from the careless way farm manures are handled, or at least not handled. If sheds or barns could be built and bedding provided for the cattle all this manure could be saved. There is no need of spending a pile of money in the construction of this shed or barn, but get good posts and put them in the ground. Use cheap lumber for rafters and lathing and cover them with riven boards. A manure and cattle-penning shed like this on every farm would raise the average farm income and do it the first year. Those who live near cheap hog lots can see and see how his barn is built and take pattern. A small barn can be built on the same style and built very cheaply. There is no excuse now when the farmer must drag along in worse condition than his father did in his by-gone days. The price of all farm products are too high to sit back and cry over had times. What we must do is to produce some of the goods—have some of this high price stuff to sell. Can you raise it and do as you have been doing? If you have not the money to make the improvements needed to get out of the poverty trail, get in touch with the Federal Loan Bank and see what can be done. They are soon to open their doors for business. The man who, however, thinks he can obtain this money with the one intention of not paying it back, is wrong. It must be paid back, but the payments are so arranged that a hobo can almost meet them. The farmer of this parish needs to raise the annual income of their farms and it should be done this season by getting better seed, better farm implements, better hogs or rather herd boars to breed up the hogs on hand, and use good bulls on the range or feed lot. There must be a good shaking up in the St. Tammany farming business to make profits in farming and no use in putting it off any longer. The opportunity has come and we might as well make use of it. Think it over, Mr. Reader, and see what you can do right now to better your condition. Don't surrender yourself as the hen did in the lines below:

"The old hen sat
In a leafless tree,
And said 'Nobody
Cares for me.'"

"My food is what
I find about,
I hunt for it,
'Till I'm frazzled out."

"My owner says
I do not pay,
And thought I ought
To sing and lay."

"I wish he had
To sit out here
And live on pickin's
All the year."
