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

Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Evans, that the board pay to Mr. C. F. Dutsch the sum of \$38.52 as a balance due him for lumber furnished for the teachers' cottage for the Progress school, provided this money be paid from the first available funds in the Fifth Ward Special Tax Fund. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Liddle, seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that the following budget of expenditures be adopted to take the place of the one adopted August 16, 1916. Carried.

The budget receipts adopted in July amounting to \$37,546.43 will remain the same.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Kahl, that all school buildings owned by the board shall be insured and that the premium be paid from the General Fund. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Evans and seconded by Mr. Millar, that the Director from the fourth ward, and the superintendent, be authorized to make any arrangements necessary to dispose of the pine knots and other wood now cut on section 15 town 4 north range 12 east, in the fourth ward of this parish. Carried.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Levy, who moved its adoption, and it was seconded by Mr. O'Keefe and unanimously adopted, to-wit: Whereas, at a meeting of this board held on October 5, 1916, a proposition was made to this board by certain citizens of the third ward that if this board would operate a school bus between the Three Mile Still (so called) and the Covington high school, for the balance of the year, that the patrons of this school transfer would provide the purchase price for the bus to be secured; and Whereas, the treasurer of this board has only received to date the sum of \$17.00; and Whereas, according to the above

agreement there remains the sum of \$13.00 to be paid for this school wagon or bus; therefore, Be it resolved, That these patrons of this transfer be notified and public notice be given that this balance of \$13.00 must be raised by the first day of February, 1917, or the parish board will consider themselves released from this agreement. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Levy and seconded by Mr. Millar, that the bill of \$7.65 from Theobald Bros., for repairs on Three Mile Still school bus be paid from the general fund. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Evans, that Mr. Fred J. Heintz be appointed as trustee officer for the entire third ward, to serve without compensation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Levy and seconded by Mr. Evans, that the Baptist Society of Pearl River, represented by Mrs. H. J. Willis, be given the right to hold services in the Pearl River school house on Sundays, until further notice. This permission is given with the understanding that Mrs. Willis will obligate herself to be responsible for any damage done to the building that may be caused by the use of the school house, and that all expense for fuel and necessary janitorship be met by the congregation represented by Mrs. H. J. Willis. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Levy and seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that the note of R. C. Cooper for \$100, due on the first of January, 1917, be renewed until July 1, 1917, provided Mr. Cooper will pay the interest due up to January 1, 1917. On the failure of Mr. Cooper to pay this interest the sale of the old Sun school house and site to be declared null and void and the superintendent and fifth ward director be given the authority to readvertise this property for sale and that bids be received up to the date of the next regular meeting of this board. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that the superintendent be appointed as the sole purchasing agent for the parish school board. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that the board will hereafter approve no bills for supplies, etc., unless an order has been obtained from the purchasing agent for the items mentioned in the bill. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Liddle and seconded by Mr. Millar, that the board pay from the general fund the expenses for the superintendent to attend the Convention of Superintendents Division of the National Education Association to be held in Kansas City, in February. Carried. The superintendent presented the application of Mr. P. A. Ross for an increase of ten dollars per month in salary as principal of the Tallsheek school. Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Levy, that the board will not be able to grant this request because of the lack of funds in the sixth ward special tax fund caused by the loss of the Tallsheek school from fire, although they do not want this vote to be considered as an expression of their estimate of the value of Mr. Ross's services. The treasurer having reported the receipt of \$17.15 for the benefit of the Progress school an appropriation

of ten dollars was made to create a new library for that school and an appropriation of five dollars to be used for an addition to the present library at Progress school. A book case for the new library will also be furnished.

The following petition from Oak Lawn, asking for a school was received, and after a discussion was laid upon the table:

Oak Lawn, La., Oct. 22, 1916. To the Honorable School Board of St. Tammany Parish: We, the undersigned residents of Oak Lawn and vicinity, respectfully request that a public school be established at this place for the following reasons:

1. That there are twenty-two white children of school age who are debarred the benefit of education, for the lack of a school.
2. That several summer residents returned to their homes with their children who would otherwise have remained here had there been school facilities.
3. That the children of those whose vocation compels them to remain here are forced to forego that first necessary and valuable requisite to good citizenship and the means of future good to their state, country and themselves.
4. That the laws demand that all children must attend school.
5. That we believe the parish of St. Tammany owes it to her proud name and importance in this state to educate its children.
6. That signers of this petition have been assured a school house and the land whereon to build it, which will be presented to the

school board if this very necessary petition be granted.
