On motion duly seconded and carried, above was referred to the Finance Committee. Moved by H. A. Mackie, seconded by J. E. Nilson, that the council appropriate the sum of \$50 to defray the expenses of the committee to appear before the Railroad Commission at Baton Rouge on the 20th instant, in reference to depot suit. Carried.

The petition of Dr. F. F. Young, asking for exemption from taxation of the "Fenwick Sanitarium" property was taken up. On motion of J. E. Nilson, seconded by H. A. Mackie, and carried, said property was exempted from taxation for the year 1916.

Mr. Louis Wehrli, represented by Attorney T. M. Burns, appeared before the council to ask that Section 1 of Ordinance No. 53, be amended so as to permit him to build a residence on the lots designated as Nos. 1, 2, 3, Square 4, Division of St. John.

Moved by H. A. Mackie, seconded by R. Smith, that Section 1 of Ordinance No. 53, be so amended provided Mr. Wehrli will guarantee to build one residence only on said lots, to cost not less than \$2000.00 and that the roof be covered with slate.

The following ordinance, drawn up by Mr. Burns, was offered by Mr. Mackie:

AN ORDINANCE Amending Section 1 of Ordinance No. 53 of the Town of Covington, known as the "Fire Ordinance."

It was moved by H. A. Mackie and seconded by A. R. Smith, that the following amendment be adopted:

Be it resolved that Section 1 of Ordinance No. 53, known as the "Fire Ordinance," be amended as follows: That portion of square 4, Division of St. John, Town of Covington, forming the corner of Rutland and New Hampshire streets, with a frontage of ninety-three (93) feet on Rutland street, from the corner of New Hampshire street, and running back, between parallel lines, with a frontage and depth of one hundred and twenty (120) feet, more or less, on New Hampshire street, to the property of Walter Galatas, be and the same is hereby eliminated from that portion of the town of Covington, included within said Section 1, of Ordinance No. 53, known as the "Fire Ordinance."

Yea: Emilie Frederick, A. R. Smith, H. A. Mackie, J. E. Nilson. Nays: None.

And the amendment was adopted. Moved by H. A. Mackie, seconded by H. A. Mackie, that Marshal Herman Schultz be allowed \$15.00 extra pay for one month beginning Thursday, March 8, 1916, attending to the street work. Carried.

The Mayor appointed Emilie Frederick, J. E. Nilson and H. A. Mackie on committee to purchase a piece of property to be used as a cemetery.

The Mayor appointed A. R. Smith, J. E. Nilson and H. A. Mackie on committee to draw up certain ordinances.

There being no further business, on motion duly seconded, the council adjourned.

It was moved by Mr. Band and seconded by Dr. Maylie that the contract for building a bulkhead at the east end of sea wall be given to Geo. E. Reine, for the sum of \$75, and it is agreed that the work shall be completed within 30 days from date.

Moved by Dr. Maylie, seconded by Mr. Band, that the Mayor appoint a committee of two, with the Mayor and Town Attorney as ex-officio members, to call on the officials of the N. O. G. N. Railroad with a view of securing a new depot for the town of Mandeville, and that the actual expenses of said committee be paid by the town council.

Be it resolved by the Town Council of Mandeville, La., in regular session assembled, that from and after January 1, 1918, the Town Council of Mandeville, La., is positively op-

posed to and shall refuse to grant a permit or license to any person, persons, firm, corporation or association, to open, run, conduct or manage a barroom, saloon, cafe, cabaret or beer garden, or any place of whatsoever nature wherein or wherefrom is to be sold spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or any intoxicating liquors or beverages of any kind or make, on Lake Street, generally known as "The Beach," or on any side street within a distance of two hundred and fifty (250) feet north of the side walk or banquet, on said Lake Street or Beach.

Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed as applying to restaurants, run and conducted solely and only as such. Moved by Dr. Maylie and seconded by Mr. Band, that the above resolution be passed.

For: Maylie, Band, Hartman. Against: Smith. Three for, 1 against. Carried.

CHARTER of the PINE STUMP PRODUCTS CO., INCORPORATED.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Before me, Karl J. Kohnke, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared to me, Notary, that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State relative to the organization of corporations, and more especially of Act 267 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1914, they have covenanted and agreed, and by these presents do covenant and agree for themselves, their successors and assigns, to form themselves into a corporation and body politic, for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations hereinafter set forth, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be The Pine Stump Product Company, Incorporated.

And its domicile is hereby established at Covington, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana; and under its corporate name, said corporation shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued; to make and

use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to hold, receive, have, purchase, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its said corporate name, property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents and managers or employees as the interests or convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary and proper, and the same to change and alter at pleasure; and do all other acts and things permitted by law, or as shall be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

Said corporation unless sooner dissolved, in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared to be: The manufacture and sale of turpentine, rosin, tar and charcoal, and all other pine productions, and their by-products. The conducting of a general commissary and mercantile business; and generally to do all things that are necessary, incidental to or connected with the carrying on of said business and the objects and purposes hereinabove set forth.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000) Dollars, divided into one hundred and twenty (120) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, provided, that the amount to which the capital stock of this corporation may be increased, shall be One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars. Which stock may be issued at not less than par for cash, at the time it is subscribed for, or at such time as may be deemed proper by the Board of Directors, provided that said stock shall be paid for in full within twelve months after same shall have been subscribed for, or in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, provided that all stock certificates shall be signed by the president and secretary of said corporation and no stock shall be issued unless the consideration therefor has been received by said corporation.

All transfers of stock shall be made on the books of said company at its office, on the surrender of the certificate therefor.

All of said stock has been subscribed for. If, in addition, any stock of this corporation is exchanged either in whole or in part for property or good will, in that event the provisions of Section 3 of Act 267 of 1914 shall be complied with strictly.

ARTICLE IV. The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors, which shall consist of five (5) stockholders, a majority of three (3) of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Said Directors shall be elected annually from among the stockholders on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of March of each year, commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March, 1918.

Notice of such election must be delivered, personally or by deposit in the postoffice, properly addressed to each stockholder, at least fifteen days before such meeting.

At said election, and at all other meetings of the stockholders, the voting shall be by ballot, and each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote by the owner in person, or by written proxy.

Within one week of their election, as above provided for, the Board of Directors shall elect from among their number, a president, a vice-president, a secretary-treasurer and a general manager, provided one person may hold the office of both secretary and treasurer, and all of said officers and directors shall hold their respective offices for a period of one year from the date of their election, or until their successors are elected. But the failure to hold an annual election, or to elect the officers as above provided for, shall not result in a dissolution of this corporation, but the then Board of

Directors and officers shall hold their offices until their successors are duly elected.

Any vacancies occurring in said Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board for the unexpired term, at a meeting called for that purpose, after five (5) days notice in writing, sent by mail to said Directors at their last known residence.

The said Board of Directors shall have the power to make all by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and conduct of the affairs of this corporation, and to change, alter, abolish and amend same at pleasure, and shall have and exercise all the powers conferred by law on this corporation and as set forth generally above.

The said Board of Directors may also delegate any of said powers in the transaction of the business of this corporation, to committees of their own body, or to the officers and agents of this corporation.

The first Board of Directors of this corporation are hereby declared to be: Henry B. Pruden, Covington, La.; Emilie Beaucaudray, New Orleans, La.; J. L. Watkins, Covington, La.; William Biery, Covington, La.; and Robert F. Broussard, New Iberia, La.; with Henry B. Pruden as president, Emilie Beaucaudray as vice-president, J. L. Watkins as secretary-treasurer, and William Biery as general manager, who shall hold their respective offices until the first Tuesday after the first Monday of March, 1918, or until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE V. This charter may be modified or altered, the capital stock thereof increased or decreased, or the corporation may be dissolved, or the corporation may be dissolved with the capital stock present or represented at any meeting of the stockholders held for that purpose, after prior notice in writing to each stockholder, or mailed to him at his last known postoffice address, all in accordance with the terms of Act 267 of 1914.

ARTICLE VI. At the expiration of this charter or the earlier dissolution of this corporation for any cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by one or more liquidators to be elected by the stockholders, all of whom shall hold stock in this corporation, and said liquidators are hereby vested with full power and authority to liquidate the affairs of said corporation, with full power to act under the terms of section 30 of Act 267 of 1914.

ARTICLE VII. The appearers hereby declare that they have subscribed to the following number of shares of the capital stock of this corporation, to-wit: Henry B. Pruden, Covington, La., thirty (30) shares. Emilie Beaucaudray, 223 S. Derbigny street, New Orleans, La., thirty (30) shares. J. L. Watkins, Covington, La., thirty (30) shares. William Biery, Covington, La., twenty-eight (28) shares, herein represented by Henry B. Pruden, duly authorized.

Robert F. Broussard, New Iberia, La., two (2) shares, herein represented by Henry B. Pruden, duly authorized.
