(Continued from page 1) and is hereby amended to the extent of changing the fine for its violation from \$2.50 or five days in jail to not less than \$2.50 nor more than \$10, or more than ten days in jail, or both, at the discretion of the Mayor. And the marshal be instructed to enforce the ordinance.

New Business.

The J. Watts Kearney communication was referred to the town attorney for answer. That of Mr. Chas. Schellhaas was laid over to next meeting. Mr. Chas. A. David was given permission to build a platform as per his written request, under the supervision of the improvement committee, on motion of Mr. Band, seconded by Mr. Hartman.

Moved by Dr. Maylie, seconded by Mr. Band, that \$10 be appropriated to the N. O. Charity Hospital Sprinkler Fund.

For: Smith, Band, Hartman, Depre and Maylie. Against: None. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hartman seconded by Mr. Band, that a reward of \$10 be and is hereby offered and paid to any one giving information that will lead to the arrest and conviction of the persons that stole the gasoline from the fire engine on the night of April 23.

For: Smith, Band, Hartman, Depre, Maylie. Against: None. Carried.

Moved by Dr. Maylie, seconded by Mr. Band: That the board of aldermen of the town of Mandeville, in regular session convened, does hereby approve and endorse the attached petition of the property holders, taxpayers, citizens and residents of the town of Mandeville to the New Orleans Great Northern Railroad Company for a new passenger depot for and in the town of Mandeville, and that the Mayor appoint a suitable committee to at once take up the matter with the proper officials of the N. O. G. N. Railroad Co. Carried.

Mr. J. L. Black, of the Black & Laird Construction Co., addressed the council relative to his list of amounts due by his company for sea wall work, previously handed to the Mayor. After a general discussion in which the town attorney took part, Mr. Black made affidavit before Mr. Lewis L. Morgan, Notary Public, to a schedule of accounts, which were taken by the town attorney for recording in the parish clerk's office.

The council then went into executive session.

Upon resuming the open session, the secretary announced that upon the written authorization of the Black & Laird Construction Co., the town council would advance the wages due the laborers and charge same to said company's account. The authorization was given and the money was paid.

The council then adjourned to Monday, May 6, at 3 p. m.
