A WAR MEASURE ON DOGS.

(The Progressive Farmer.)

There is an old saying that "some people are so rich they can't afford any dog at all; but there are others so poor they can afford from five to ten dogs." At every cabin you will find from one to six dogs, perhaps more. These dogs must live. Their owners cannot or will not feed them; so the dogs live off someone else who perhaps wants no dogs around. They menace our farming interest by destroying the nests and young of our insectivorous birds; and they eat millions of young quail and rabbits that would otherwise be left for human consumption and prove a great source of pin money to the farmer boy. In looking at corn crops quite frequently one finds a great many stalks broken down and the ears eaten off by hungry dogs; while one is extremely lucky to obtain what few plums or muscadines the dogs don't want.

Our main grievance against the dog is the fact that he greatly threatens our livestock industry. We lose many millions of dollars annually in income from mutton and wool, just because we have no laws in effect which really protect us from the sheep-killing dog. We cannot blame the cautious farmer for not being in any great hurry to invest a small fortune in a good ram to head his herd, when he feels there is a chance of losing from 1 per cent to 75 per cent of his increase by the depredations of dogs alone. No hungry dog ever misses a chance to eat his fill of whatever dead carcass he may find. In this way he scatters such diseases as foot-and-mouth disease, hog cholera, anthrax, and he is highly suspicious as being instrumental in the spreading of other diseases not so well known.

From the standpoint of conserving our national food resources it is evident to every serious thinking person that all such worthless consumers must go, and thus leave so much more food (to be purchased, at a less cost) to be used by the genushomo. Every dog that Nation's soil feeds increases the food supply and increases the cost, just as much as does one more non-producing human inhabitant. The pampered pup in my lady's kennel takes much care, food and human attention as does a motherless babe who is made in the image of our God; while a full grown dog will consume as much food as a full grown man.

All of us who profess the least patriotism are making a strenuous effort, leaving nothing undone, in our attempt to induce all of our human parasites to become producers of bread or its equivalent. Let us, therefore, one and all, enlist our efforts in the great cause of eliminating by legislation, taxation, dog-catchers, or poison, all of our non-producing canine enemies.

AMENDMENT TO CHARTER

of the

PICATUNE TURPENTINE CO.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it known that on this 13th day of July, A. D. 1917, before me, Harvey E. Ellis, a Notary Public, within and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally came and appeared Hubert C. Bailey and E. Jones, residents of said parish, to me personally known, who declared that the said Hubert C. Bailey was chairman and the said E. Jones was the secretary of a meeting of the stockholders of the Picatune Turpentine Co., held at Covington, Louisiana, the domicile of said corporation, on the 11th day of July, 1917, said stockholders, waiving notice, an advertisement provided by Articles VI and VIII of the charter of said corporation and all other notices required by law, and that at said meeting there were a total of sixty-one (61) shares present, being all the stock issued of said corporation.

And appereers declared that at such meeting of such stockholders a resolution was adopted by the unanimous vote of all the stockholders that Articles I and III of the articles of incorporation of said corporation should be amended, and said articles were duly amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE I.

"The name and style of this corporation shall be Southern Naval Stores Warehouse Co., Inc., and by said corporate name it shall have succession and enjoy existence for a period of ninety-nine years, unless sooner dissolved, in the manner provided by law, and the articles of this charter; and under said corporate name it shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, the same to alter or break at pleasure; to make all necessary rules and regulations for its corporate management and control, and shall have and enjoy all the rights, privileges and immunities which are now conferred upon, or may hereafter be granted to corporations of the same kind and character."

ARTICLE III.

"The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized are hereby declared to be engaged in and carry on the business of public warehouses in general and the warehousing of naval stores in particular, and for this purpose to issue warehouse receipts in conformity with the laws of Louisiana, both negotiable and non-negotiable, to persons warehousing goods, and to make reasonable charges therefor, and to make advances or loans upon the security of such goods, or otherwise to acquire and own by purchase, lease, or otherwise, buildings, yards and warehouses, tanks and tank cars, and in aid of its business, and when necessary or incidental thereto, may acquire, own, lease and operate railroads, spur tracks, bridges, steamboats and other water craft."

And said appereers declared that they were authorized and instructed by said stockholders' meeting to execute the proper notarial act amending the charter of said corporation in accordance with the vote of said stockholders.

And said appereers thereupon declared that the articles of incorporation of said Picatune Turpentine Co. have been duly and legally amended by the vote of the stockholders of said corporation, and they make this declaration and execute this notarial act in accordance therewith.
