ORDINANCE NO. 65. An ordinance granting the privilege to the Great Southern Lumber Company, of Bogalusa, La., of constructing a sweet potato kiln building on Thoard Avenue, opposite the St. Tammany Ice & Manufacturing Co., from the south side thereof, to the extent of 12 by 45 feet.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council in regular session convened, That the Great Southern Lumber Company, of Bogalusa, La., be and it is hereby granted the right and privilege of constructing a sweet potato kiln building on Thoard Ave. opposite the St. Tammany Ice & Manufacturing Co., from the south side of said Avenue, to the extent of 12 by 45 feet; provided said building shall be for the public use, and limited to the purpose of its construction, and at all times subject to the control and supervision of the Parish Council of Defense.

AN ORDINANCE. Fixing a budget for the year 1917.
