**MRS. WARNER MAKES REPORT**

All the Auxiliaries are continuing their excellent work. Since last report we have received work as follows:

Slidell.

176 pieces assorted surgical dressings, 7 sample boxes (20 pieces surgical dressings each), 39 shoulder wraps, 6 pairs pajamas, 25 bed shirts.

Lacombe.

160 pieces assorted surgical dressings, 12 bed shirts, 12 pairs pajamas.

Mandeville.

308 pieces assorted surgical dressings, 10 bed shirts, 24 pairs pajamas.

Madisonville.

179 pieces assorted surgical dressings, 20 bed shirts, 6 pair pajamas.

Folsom.

135 pieces assorted surgical dressings, 6 pairs pajamas, 20 bed shirts.

Talisheek.

12 pairs pajamas, 2 bed shirts, 4 pairs knitted socks.

Covington.

499 pieces assorted surgical dressings, 30 suits pajamas, 13 bed shirts, 8 pairs knitted socks, 1 pair knitted wristlets, 9 knitted sweaters, 2 knitted helmets.

This makes a total for the parish of 1457 pieces of surgical dressing and 249 garments.

We have forwarded to New Orleans since last report 1457 pieces of surgical dressing, 84 suits pajamas, 39 shoulder wraps, 102 bed shirts, 9 knit sweaters, 2 knit helmets, 12 pairs knit socks, 1 pair wristlets, 7 sample boxes (20 pieces) surgical dressing.

The small amount of work turned out during the period is due to many of the members having taken out knitting, and also loss of time by Auxiliaries preparing for the fair exhibits.

Since last report I have secured the following subscriptions for the purchase of a knitting machine: Miss M. C. Cole, \$5.00; Mrs. A. H. Clemens, \$5.00; Miss M. E. Warner, \$5.00; Mrs. S. Hartwig, \$1.00; Mr. Hartwig, \$1.00; Mrs. Rennie, \$1.00; Mrs. Raphael, \$1.00; Helen Maida Warner, \$1.00. Total, \$20.00, with which I purchased a Gearhart knitting machine for knitting socks.

This machine was recommended by the Washington office of the American Red Cross. We expect to have the machine in operation in our rooms in the next few days.

There are fifty of our members now making knitted garments, and our next report should show a decided increase in the amount of work turned in.
