ORDINANCES.

AN ORDINANCE making it unlawful for any person or persons to own, keep, or have in her or his possession any dog, or permit to remain on his or her premises any dog which shall have killed or maimed or bit any sheep or lamb, and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Whereas, this portion of the State of Louisiana is well adapted to the sheep industry; and

Whereas, this industry would greatly prosper and would be a source of great profit but for the ravage of dogs; therefore,

Section 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, in regular session convened, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to own, keep, or have in her or his possession any dog, or permit to remain on his or her premises any dog which shall have killed, maimed or bit any sheep or lamb.

Section 2. Be it ordained, etc., That whenever shall knowingly own, keep or have in her or his possession any dog, or permit to remain on his or her premises any dog which shall have killed, maimed or bit any sheep or lamb shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$25.00, and imprisonment not less than 30 days, or both, at the discretion of the court. Creditable information from others verified by oath and communicated to the owners or keepers of said dogs, and strong circumstantial evidence as well as personal experience of such owner or keeper, shall constitute knowledge in the sense of this section.

Section 3. Be it ordained, etc., That all ordinances, or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its passage.

It was moved by J. M. Smith and seconded by Geo. Koepff, that the above ordinance be adopted, to go into effect May 1, 1918.

ORDINANCE NO. 67.
