THE STATE SENATE WINS FOR LOUISIANA THE DISTINCTION OF BEING THE FIRST STATE TO VOTE FOR BOOZE.

Louisiana is again a victim of politics of the big city. Liquor is a useful thing to the bosses. Dinners and wine, cabarets and bright lights, horse races and a general free rein make vote-getting easy. But it doesn't make getting business easy. It doesn't speak for factories and industry and financial advancement. It doesn't appeal to investment in anything but a brewery.

The senators of the Louisiana legislature who voted against the Constitutional amendment have not only defeated the will of the people, but they have placed the State on the list of nonprogressives and made it more difficult, in a long way, to carry out the plans of the Government and to establish thrift and economy. Booze never made any one more efficient. The only argument in favor of allowing its manufacture was the disturbance to invested capital and labor. Today its abolition means conservation of food and the furnishing of labor for war service at a time when it is greatly needed.

The strong vote in the House for the measure shows that the people wanted it, and the tie in the Senate will give the opposition in that body the discredit of having defeated the will of the people. There is little doubt but that there will be national prohibition, and it is unfortunate that Louisiana could not put a star in her service flag. But she will not remain a slacker in this respect. The question will be voted on again and the result may be different.

St. Tammany parish is to be congratulated that her representative, J. Monroe Simmons, voted for the amendment. He has shown that he may be depended upon to do the right thing, and he has won friends who appreciate the stand he has taken, both for moral uplift and Government support in time of war. He did not help to make Louisiana the first state to vote for booze.

Y. M. C. A. STARTS CAMPAIGN TO ENLIST HELPERS.

Forced by the decision of President Wilson and Secretary Baker to increase the nation's military establishment "to the limit," the Y. M. C. A. has doubled its machinery for recruiting workers in the camps of America and overseas and has organized a committee to tour the South and present the appeal of the National War Work Council to men who are beyond fighting age, with the opportunity for patriotic service in providing recreation and keeping up the morale of the troops. The recruiters began their tour in Richmond, Va., on Wednesday, May 8. Hundreds of enlistments are expected as the result of the direct appeal. Local recruiting committees will continue the work started by the travelers.

One of the most important features of the appeal to be made in the South is a cable message received from France last week. "Both Precent Poincare and Premier Clemenceau," it read, "emphasize in strongest terms the need of co-operation, and many of our American generals insist that our work must keep pace with our military expansion."

The message which was signed by Dr. John R. Mott, secretary of the War Council, adds: "After close study of present requirements and careful forecast, I am convinced that we must have in each month from May to September, inclusive, seven hundred workers for the American troops in France and England, fifty for the French Army and ten for the Italian Army. Making allowances for expiring contracts and casualties will swell the total to considerably over eight hundred."

"Of this total 140 should be women for American work, and five for French work. Because of the difficulty of recruiting in July and August, I recommend a double output in May and June."

As workers are not enlisting fast enough to satisfy these war needs, the Y. M. C. A. is going to recruit them as men are recruited for the army and navy. A recent tour of the Middle West produced large returns; the South is expected to do well.

How great Y. M. C. A. Expansion has been since the United States entered the war is shown by a comparison of figures. The original estimate called for 1,500 workers in the American army. Already more than 7,000 are wearing the uniform with the Red Triangle, either in this country or overseas. Six hundred and fifty were sent to France in April, fifty-seven are reaching their posts in spite of the fact that the vessel on which they sailed was torpedoed and sunk. More than 200 workers are now at Princeton for intensive training before going overseas.

As the military forces of the nation increase, this stream of Y. M. C. A. workers must increase if the Association is not to falter in the duties which have been intrusted to it by the government. There is need for hut secretaries, athletic directors, automobile drivers and mechanics and numerous other workers. The committee which is being sent into the South includes Douglas L. Eilman and A. G. Knebel, executive secretary of War Personnel Board, Franklin Kibbide and James A. Whitmore, members of the National War Work Council, only recently returned from France.
