The resignation of Paul J. Dullon, street commissioner and Board of Health inspector, was read, as follows:

To the Honorable Mayor and Town Council of Covington:
Gentlemen:—This is to tender to you my resignation as street commissioner and health inspector of the town of Covington, La., to take effect at the expiration of the month. Thanking you gentlemen for past favors, I remain,

On motion of M. P. Planché, seconded by Emile Frederick, and carried, said resignation was accepted. Moved by A. D. Schwartz, seconded by M. P. Planché, that the office of street commissioner and health inspector be combined with that of day marshal, and that the salary for the three offices be fixed at the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) per month, beginning with the first day of July, 1918. Carried.

The resignation of G. M. Loyd, night marshal, was read, as follows: To the Honorable Mayor and Town Council of Covington:

Dear Sirs:—My connection with you honorable body has been agreeable to me, and I fully appreciate the courtesies and kindness shown me, but I have the chance to be greatly benefitted in salary, and this is most necessary at this time as you all very well understand, so I would like to be relieved on July 1, 1918. Moved by M. P. Planché, seconded by Emile Frederick, that same be accepted and forwarded to the Governor of Louisiana. It was moved by H. A. Mackie, seconded by M. P. Planché, that this body request the Governor of Louisiana to appoint E. W. Jones to the office of night marshal of the town of Covington, vice G. M. Loyd, resigned. Carried.

The bill of Chas. Jenkins for plans and specifications for pavilion building, amounting to \$50.00 was ordered to be paid out of the special fund.

The question of a burial ground for the colored people was brought up and the Mayor appointed H. A. Mackie, Emile Frederick and M. P. Planché to take this matter up and report at the next regular meeting. There being no further business the council adjourned.
