REV. E. A. RENNIE, FORMERLY RECTOR CHRIST'S CHURCH, COVINGTON, DEAD.

Rev. Ernest A. Rennie, formerly rector of Christ's Episcopal Church, Covington, died Saturday, July 6th, 1918, at 3 p. m., in Toronto, Canada.

Before coming to Christ Church, Covington, twelve years ago, Rev. Rennie was curate of St. Paul's parish in New Orleans.

He was born in Barton, Ontario, Canada, December 23, 1851, and received his preliminary education at Hamilton, Canada, and later attended the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, graduating in 1889.

Rev. Rennie was beloved by the people of Covington, all of whom felt a keen interest in him on account of his kind deeds to every one with whom he came in contact.

SCHOOL BOARD

(Continued from page 1)

School District No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, on July 1, 1918, met today in open session at the office of the parish school board in the town of Covington, La., at the hour of ten o'clock a. m., for the purpose of counting the votes cast at said election and examining the same both as to number and amount and inspecting and examining and compiling the returns sent in by the commissioners and clerk presiding at said election in said School District No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., on the first day of July, 1918, for and against the proposition submitted to the property taxpayers qualified as electors under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, conformably to a resolution adopted on the 20th day of May, 1918, by the St. Tammany Parish school board of the parish of St. Tammany, La.

The meeting having been regularly called to order by N. H. Fitz-Simons, president, and all members of said school board being present except Geo. R. Dutsch and J. H. Robert, did in open session and in the presence of F. J. Martindale, P. A. Ross and E. S. Blossman, three competent witnesses, and in the presence of as many others as chose to attend the examination and inspection and compilation of the returns of said election; and having ascertained from said inspection and compilation that the votes in numbers and amounts cast at the aforesaid election held in said School District No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, for and against the proposition submitted to the taxpayers of said school district by a resolution of the school board of the parish of St. Tammany adopted May 20, 1918, to-wit:

Proposition. Proposition, to levy a special tax of two and one-half mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to taxation, annually for a period of one year, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of said School District No. 9.

For, or in favor of said proposition there were cast twenty-three (23) votes, representing a taxable assessed property valuation of fifty-seven thousand eight hundred eighty-nine (\$57,889.00) dollars.

Against, or in opposition to said proposition there were cast no votes, representing a taxable assessed property valuation of nothing.

And after counting the votes, inspecting and examining the same as to numbers and amounts, and having inspected and examined and canvassed the poll list, tally sheet and compiled statement of votes made by the commissioners and clerk presiding at said election and compiling the returns of said election, we replaced in the ballot box the tickets or ballots, the poll lists, tally sheets and compiled statements of votes cast at said election, and after having sealed the same we deposited said box with the secretary of the St. Tammany Parish School Board, and having satisfied ourselves that the returns are true and correct, and that the proposition submitted to the taxpayers qualified as electors under the laws and the constitution of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election held in School District No. 9 of St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, on July 1, 1918, was carried by a majority vote in number and amount of assessed valuation of the property taxpayers voting at said election, we, the St. Tammany Parish School Board, acting as commissioners of the aforesaid election held in School District No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., in open session assembled as aforesaid, hereby declare that the said proposition submitted to the property taxpayers of the School District No. 9, by resolution of the St. Tammany Parish School Board adopted on the 20th day of May, 1918, as aforesaid, is carried, as evidenced by the compilation of the votes as hereinabove set forth; and having made public proclamation of the above results we have closed this process verbal of the compilation of the votes cast at the aforesaid election in number and amount, which is made in triplicate, one copy of which the secretary is
