CHARTER OF THE DENDINGER MERCANTILE COMPANY, INCORPORATED. United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans.

Be it known, that on this 17th day of the month of July, in the year 1918, before me, Jacob D. Dresner, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, Personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declared that they are all of lawful age and that availing themselves of the privileges of the statutes and laws of the State of Louisiana, relative to the formation of corporations, and particularly Act No. 267 of the session of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, of 1914, they have covenanted and agreed, and do by these presents covenant and agree and bind and obligate themselves, as well as all such persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a body corporate and politic in law, for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations and provisions following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be the Dendinger Mercantile Company, Incorporated, and under that name shall have and enjoy all the rights, privileges and advantages granted by law to corporations, and shall have the power and authority to enjoy succession and corporate existence for and during the period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof, unless sooner dissolved in the manner hereinafter provided for. Said corporation shall have power and authority to contract, to sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break, alter or amend at pleasure, to hold, receive, purchase, convey, deliver, mortgage, hypothecate, and pledge, any property, real or personal, and to issue notes and other obligations, negotiable instruments, or other evidence of debt; to have and employ such managers, agents and other employees as the interest and convenience of said corporation may require or demand, and to make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations for the corporate management and control of its affairs as may be deemed necessary and expedient.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is created are hereby declared to be the operating of a general merchandise store, buying, selling, and manufacturing any and all kinds of merchandise, food stuffs, and any and all things, articles, or materials that in any way make up, enter into, or are used for, the manufacture or construction of such articles or are used in connection with, or as accessory to such general merchandise business; and buying, selling, renting or leasing, managing, and in any way disposing of any mercantile or allied business or business and generally to do any and all things and acts whatsoever necessary, incidental to, connected with, or relating to the transaction of the said business of the said corporation.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at Twenty-four thousand (\$24,000.00) dollars, divided into or represented by two hundred and forty (240) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, and when issued shall be paid for in cash or property or in the equivalent thereof. No certificate of stock shall be issued until the same shall have been paid for. The stock shall be evidenced by certificates issued and signed by the president and secretary. All shares of stock shall be issued as full paid and non-assessable and no transfer of stock shall be binding on said corporation, unless recorded on its books. No stockholder of said corporation shall sell his stock to any person not already a stockholder, until he has first offered it for sale during a period of thirty days to the then stockholders of the corporation at its then book value, and any transfer of stock made in violation of this provision shall not be recognized by the corporation.

ARTICLE IV. The domicile of this corporation shall be in the town of Madisonville, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and all citation or other legal process shall be served upon the president, and in his absence, as the law directs.

ARTICLE V. All of the powers of this corporation shall be vested in, and the management and control of its affairs shall be exercised by a board of directors, to be composed of not less than five (5) stockholders, three (3) of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the corporation, each of whom shall own in his own right, during the term of office, at least one full paid and pledged share of the capital stock of this corporation.

The first board of directors of this corporation shall be composed of Theodore Dendinger, Sr., John Dendinger, George Dendinger, Theodore Dendinger, Jr., and James N. Cornet. The officers of the first board of directors shall be Theodore Dendinger, Sr., president; Theodore Dendinger, Jr., vice-president; James N. Cornet, secretary-treasurer. The said board of directors and the said officers above named shall serve and remain in office until the first Tuesday in July, 1919, on which day, and annually thereafter, the board of directors shall be elected by the

ORDINANCE. Whereas, in the opinion of this board it is necessary and advisable that a special election be ordered to be held in School District No. 10 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., at which there shall be submitted the following proposition, to-wit: To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of \$20,000 to run not longer than ten years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building at Abita Springs, La., and purchase a site, if necessary, for the said school building within the said school district No. 10, title to which shall vest in the public.

Be it resolved by the St. Tammany, La., Parish School Board in legal session convened, as follows: Section 1. That a special election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in School District No. 10 in the parish of St. Tammany, La., on Tuesday, August 20, 1918, at which there shall be submitted the following proposition:

To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of \$20,000.00 to run not longer than ten years from date and to bear interest not to exceed five per cent per annum payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building at Abita Springs, La., and purchasing a site, if necessary, for the said school building, title to which shall vest in the public.

Section 2. That the secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election a sufficient number of ballots on each of which shall be printed the proposition printed in section one of this ordinance, arranged in such manner as to enable the voters to vote on each separately and in the following form:

And that the secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, list of voters and compiled statement of voters in number and amount.

Section 3. That the polling place for said election shall be at the town hall of Abita Springs, La., and Jules Hargouin, A. Q. Foss and B. Kustemacher are hereby appointed commissioners, and C. H. Miller clerk of said election, to serve at said polling place in said election, and said election shall be conducted under the laws of the state applicable thereto.

Section 4. The president of the board is hereby instructed to give notice of the special election herein ordered by his proclamation to be published according to law, and in said proclamation he shall announce that at 10 o'clock a. m., on Friday, August 23, 1918, this board will meet at its usual meeting place in the town of Covington, La., and in open session proceed to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election.
