AN ORDINANCE. Providing for a speed of autos, trucks, etc., not to exceed 15 miles per hour on the Madisonville road and regulating the method of cars passing each other, and providing a penalty for the violation of the same.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., that on or after the date of the promulgation of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any one to operate or cause to be operated any automobile, truck or motor bus on the road between Madisonville and Covington at a greater speed than fifteen (15) miles per hour.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that all such vehicles shall be before passing each other be reduced to a speed of not more than ten miles per hour.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, that the attempt of any chauffeur to pass another car, truck or bus at speed greater than fifteen miles an hour shall be deemed guilty of a double offense.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, that any person or persons who shall violate this ordinance in any particular shall be subject to a fine of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars, or to imprisonment not to exceed thirty (30) days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, that any ordinance or part of ordinance in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, that this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication in the official journal of the parish. J. B. HOWZE, President.

They carry the conversion privilege. It was announced that 50 per cent of the over-subscription would be taken. Nine million subscribers subscribed \$4,917,432,000 of the bonds, an over-subscription of 15 per cent. Only \$3,808,768,150 of the bonds were allotted. This campaign was marked with the same enthusiastic support of the public as its predecessor. The labor and fraternal organizations were especially active in this campaign, and the women of the country did efficient work which greatly contributed to the success of the loan. The men in the Army and Navy worked for and subscribed largely to the loan. The Third Liberty Loan campaign opened on April 6, 1918, one year exactly after our entrance into the war, and closed on May 4. The bonds of this issue bear 4-1/2 per cent interest and run for ten years, are not subject to redemption prior to maturity, and carry no conversion privilege. The loan was announced for \$3,000,000,000, but the right was reserved to accept all additional subscriptions. Seven million subscribers subscribed for \$4,170,019,650 of the bonds all of which was allotted. A great feature of this loan was its very wide distribution among the people and throughout the Union and the fact that the country districts promptly and heavily subscribed to the loan, in a great measure making up their quotas earlier than the cities. Secretary McAdoo pronounced this loan the soundest of national financing. A little over a year ago there was some 300,000 United States bondholders; there are now somewhere between 20,000,000 and 25,000,000. Awakened patriotism has made the American people a saving people, a bond-buying people. The effect of the Liberty Loans on the national character, on our national life, on the individual citizen and our home life is immeasurable of incalculable benefit. Not less incalculable is their effect on the destiny of the world as our ships plow the seas and our men and material in Europe beat back the Hun.

The Fourth Liberty Loan campaign will begin Saturday, September 28, and close October 19. No American doubts its success; no good American will fail to contribute to its success. The blood of our men fallen in Europe calls to us; our answer must be and will be worthy of them and our country.

TEACHING THE SOLDIER BOYS TO SPEAK FRENCH.

"A little knowledge of French is a dangerous thing," according to Clarence H. Kelham, the well known writer who went across on board an army transport and harkened to the soldier boys acquiring table d'hote vocabularies. He relates: "The request, 'Can't you get somebody to teach us the lingo?' is voted a hundred times on the first day out by the soldiers and it is responded to immediately by Y. M. C. A. workers, who organize a number of small classes among the men. The men pick their own method of learning French. They like to get into little groups of six or eight around an instructor and sing-song French words and phrases after him. All over the ship you can hear half a dozen soldiers with their heads together chanting, 'pommes de terre, pommes de terre, pommes de terre,' and such like valuable words for fifteen minutes at a stretch. The boys are picking it up rapidly. By the time port is made a good share of them are able to enquire their way and order a meal. Whether they get where they are wanting to go or exactly what they ask for is another matter. It is told on excellent authority that one soldier approached a Frenchman aboard and enquired in his best French if the gentleman had slept well. The Frenchman flew into a rage and a riot was prevented by a lieutenant who discovered that his man, instead of making a courteous inquiry, had accused the Frenchman of stealing his pants.

THE LIBERTY LOANS.

The United States entered the war on April 6, 1917. Eighteen days later by a practically unanimous vote Congress passed the Liberty Loan Bond Bill. On May 2 the First Liberty Loan was announced, on May 14 the details were made public, and on the 15th the campaign began and closed one month later. The issue was for \$2,000,000,000, the bonds bearing 3-1/2 per cent interest and running for 15-30 years. The bonds carried the conversion privilege, entitling the holder, if he chose, to convert them into bonds of a later issue bearing a higher rate of interest. Four and a half million subscribers from every section of the country, representing every condition, race, and class of citizens, subscribed for more than \$3,000,000,000 of the bonds. Only \$2,000,000,000 was allotted. The outstanding features of the First Liberty Loan were the promptness with which it was arranged and conducted, the patriotism of the newspapers, banks, corporations, organizations, and people generally in working for its success, and the heavy over-subscriptions of more than 50 per cent. Another notable feature was that there was interruption to the business of the country occasioned by the unprecedented demand upon its money resources. The Second Liberty Loan campaign opened on October 1, 1917, and closed on October 27. The bonds of this issue bear 4 per cent interest and run for 10-25 years.

PROCLAMATION OF ELECTION.

Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish held on the 18th day of July, 1918, I, J. B. Howze, president of the said Police Jury, hereby give notice that, in compliance with said ordinance, a special election will be held in Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, on the 27th day of August, 1918, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the constitution and laws of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of \$150,000.00 to run not longer than twenty-seven years from date of the bonds, and in a lesser time, if the governing authority deems it to the best interest of the Road District, and to bear interest not to exceed five per cent per annum payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing, improving and maintaining the public roads in said District.

For the purpose of said special election the polling places will be as follows: Ward 1—Madisonville, at the courthouse. Ward 3—Covington, at the courthouse. Ward 4—Mandeville, at the Town Hall. Ward 10—Abita Springs, at the Town Hall.

At said election the polls will open at 7 o'clock a. m., and close at 5 o'clock p. m., according to law. Notice is also given that at 10 o'clock a. m., on the 29th day of August, 1918, said Police Jury, acting as Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, will meet at Covington, La., and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, canvass the returns and declare the result of said special election. This 18th day of July, 1918. J. B. HOWZE, President of Police Jury.

On motion of Geo. Koepf, seconded by J. M. Smith, which was duly carried, the following ordinance was unanimously adopted: AN ORDINANCE. Be it ordained that the ordinance passed on the 11th day of June, 1918, creating and establishing Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., be and the same is hereby repealed.

On motion of George Koepf, seconded by J. M. Smith, the following ordinance was introduced: AN ORDINANCE. An Ordinance establishing Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana. Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, that it does hereby create and there is hereby created Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, said Road District No. One to consist of and be co-extensive with the territory comprised within Wards One, Three, Four and Ten of the Parish of St. Tammany.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that the said Road District No. One, as above created, shall have and exercise all the power and authority conferred on Road Districts by the Constitution and laws of this State. Section 3. Be it further ordained, that this Police Jury hereby accepts the provisions of law constituting it the governing authority of the said Road District No. One, and it hereby qualifies as such.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, that Covington, Louisiana, the county seat of the Parish of St. Tammany, is hereby designated as the domicile of the said Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, La. Section 5. Be it further ordained, that this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon promulgation thereof. This ordinance having been put to a vote and the roll called the result was as follows: Affirmative—Koepf, Fendlasson, Domergue, Smith, Cowart, Crawford, Davis, Robert, Abney, Howze, Nays—None. And the ordinance was declared carried. On motion of E. P. Robert, seconded by Jos. Smith, it was duly moved that a committee of three be appointed by the President of the Police Jury for the purpose of having what is known as the Hammond-Covington road, which covers a distance of about seven miles in St. Tammany parish, located and surveyed; and to this end, to communicate with the State Highway Department in order to secure their cooperation and financial assistance. The committee to report back to the Police Jury as soon as possible. Whereupon the Chair appointed Harvey E. Ellis, George Koepf and E. J. Domergue. Covington, La., July 18, 1918. The Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, sitting and acting as Road District No. One of St. Tammany Parish, met this day. Present: Geo. Koepf, H. N. Fendlasson, E. J. Domergue, J. M. Smith, S. R. Cowart, Fletcher Crawford, W. H. Davis, E. P. Robert, Robert C. Abney and J. B. Howze. Present, ten members. Absent, none. AN ORDINANCE. An Ordinance calling a special election in Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, La. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., acting as the governing authority of Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., on August 27, 1918, between the hours of seven (7) o'clock a. m. and five (5) p. m., and that at said election there shall be submitted to the taxpayers residing within said Road District qualified under the Constitution and laws of this State to vote at the said election, a proposition to authorize the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, acting as the governing authority of Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, to incur debt on behalf of and in the name of Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, to the amount of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$150,000) Dollars, and to issue and sell negotiable bonds, and to issue and sell bearing coupon bonds, and to incur the said indebtedness (the amount of the said indebtedness being less than ten per cent of the assessed valuation of the property in said Road District); said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually; the interest and principal of said bonds to be payable in such amounts and at such places as the governing authority may determine, in twenty-seven (27) years from the date of the bonds, and in a lesser time if the governing authority in its discretion deems it to the best interest of the Road District; and both the principal and interest of said bonds to be secured by a sufficient tax to be levied and collected each year in accordance with Article 281 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, and the laws of the State of Louisiana, the proceeds from the sale of the said bonds at not less than par to be used in constructing, improving and maintaining the public roads and highways within Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, La. Be it further ordained, that there shall be published in the official journal of the Parish of St. Tammany for thirty (30) days a notice of the said special election, and notice to embrace substantially all things above set forth and also notice that this Police Jury, as the governing authority of Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, will meet in open session at the District Courthouse in Covington, La., at 10 o'clock a. m., on August 29th, 1918, and then and there proceed to open the ballot boxes used in said election, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, canvass and canvass the returns and declare the result of the said election. Be it further ordained, that the President of the Police Jury be and he is hereby authorized and directed to have the necessary ballots printed for the said special election, which ballots shall contain the foregoing proposition and be drawn up in accordance with law and the provisions of this ordinance; and he is also authorized and directed to arrange for providing the ballot boxes, the necessary blanks for tally sheets and compiled statements. Be it further ordained, that the Clerk of Court and Ex-officio Registrar of Voters shall furnish to the election officers hereinafter named for said special election with a list of the taxpayers in said Road District No. One entitled to vote in person or by proxy at the said special election, together with the assessed value of each taxpayer's property as shown by the assessment roll last made and filed prior to said special election. Be it further ordained, that the following polling places, all within Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, are hereby designated and determined upon: In Ward 1—Madisonville, La. In Ward 3—Covington, La. In Ward 4—Mandeville, La. In Ward 10—Abita Springs, La. And that the following persons, all of whom are registered voters, shall act as commissioners and clerk of said election, viz: In Ward 1—Geo. Edwards, John Peter, Emile Fuhrmann, as commissioners, and Geo. R. Dutche, as clerk. In Ward 3—Chas. L. Smith, S. D. Anderson, P. S. Barell, as commissioners, and S. R. Blossman as clerk. In Ward 4—A. G. Depre, W. R. Smith, Lucas Prieto, as commissioners, and Herman Levy, as clerk. In Ward 10—F. L. Dutche, A. B. Kuntzschmacher, A. Fons, as commissioners, and G. Miller, as clerk. And that the above mentioned officers of election shall seal up the ballot boxes and deliver same to this Police Jury within forty-eight hours after the closing of the polls, and shall deliver within forty-eight hours the other duplicate tally sheet and the other duplicate compiled statement to the Clerk of Court for the Parish of St. Tammany, La. This ordinance having been put to a vote and the roll called, the result was as follows: Affirmative—Koepf, Fendlasson, Domergue, Smith, Cowart, Crawford, Davis, Robert, Abney, Howze, Nays—None. And the ordinance was declared carried. Be it ordained, etc., That, whereas, it is necessary to have expert and special legal advice and assistance in connection with the proposed issue of bonds by Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany; and whereas, Messrs. Graham and Martin, of New Orleans, are expert bond attorneys and specially versed in the legal requisites connected with issuing Public Improvement Bonds, this Police Jury, as the governing authority of Road District No. One of the Parish of St. Tammany, hereby agrees to pay the said attorneys jointly for the aforesaid services the sum of One Thousand Dollars out of the proceeds of sale of said bonds, said amount being less than the fee authorized and allowed by law.
