CHARTER OF THE DENDINGER MERCANTILE COMPANY, INCORPORATED.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans.

Be it known, that on this 17th day of the month of July, in the year 1918, before me, Jacob D. Dresner, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, Personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereto subscribed, who severally declared that they are all of lawful age and that availing themselves of the privileges of the statute and laws of the State of Louisiana, relative to the formation of corporations, and particularly Act No. 267 of the session of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, of 1914, they have covenanted and agreed, and do hereby present, covenant and agree, as well as all such persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a body corporate and politic in law, for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations and provisions following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be the Dendinger Mercantile Company, Incorporated, and under that name shall have and enjoy all the rights, privileges, and advantages granted by law to corporations, and shall have the power and authority to enjoy succession and corporate existence for and during the period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof, unless sooner dissolved in the manner hereinafter provided for.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is created are hereby declared to be the operating of a general merchandise store, buying, selling, and manufacturing any and all kinds of merchandise, articles, and materials that in any way make up, enter into, or are used for, the manufacture or construction of such articles or are used in connection with, or as accessory to such general merchandise business; and buying, selling, renting or leasing, managing, and in any way disposing of any mercantile or allied business or businesses and generally to do any and all things and acts whatsoever necessary, incidental to, connected with, or relating to the transaction of the said business of the said corporation.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at Twenty-four thousand (\$24,000.00) dollars, divided into or represented by two hundred and forty (240) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, and when issued shall be paid for in cash or property or in the equivalent thereof. No certificate of stock shall be issued until the same shall have been paid for. The stock shall be evidenced by certificates issued and signed by the president and secretary. All shares of stock shall be issued as full paid and non-assessable and no transfer of stock shall be binding on said corporation, unless recorded on its books.

ARTICLE IV. The domicile of this corporation shall be in the town of Madisonville, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and all citation or other legal process shall be served upon the president, and in his absence, as the law directs.

ARTICLE V. All of the powers of this corporation shall be vested in, and the management and control of its affairs shall be exercised by a board of directors, to be composed of not less than five (5) stockholders, three (3) of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the corporation, each of whom shall own in his own right, during the term of office, at least one full paid and unpledged share of the capital stock of this corporation.

AN ORDINANCE.

Providing for a speed of autos, trucks, etc., not to exceed 15 miles per hour on the Madisonville and regulating the method of care passing each other, and providing a penalty for the violation of the same. Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., That on or after the date of the promulgation of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any one to operate or cause to be operated any automobile, truck or motor bus on the road between Madisonville and Covington at a greater speed than fifteen (15) miles per hour.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That all such vehicles shall before passing each other be reduced to a speed of not more than ten miles per hour. Section 3. Be it further ordained, That the attempt of any chauffeur to pass another car, truck or bus at speed greater than fifteen miles an hour shall be deemed guilty of a double offense.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, That any person or persons who shall violate this ordinance in any particular shall be subject to a fine of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars, or to imprisonment not to exceed thirty (30) days, or both, at the discretion of the Court. Section 5. Be it further ordained, That any ordinance or part of ordinance in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication in the official journal of the parish. J. B. HOWES, President. F. J. MARTINDALE, Secretary.
