

Proposition.

To levy a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 10 of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to taxation, annually, for a period of thirty (30) years for the purpose of building, repairing and equipping a public school building, and purchasing a site, if necessary, in the town of Abita Springs, La.

For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be the Town Hall of Abita Springs, La., and the following clerk and commissioners of election have been appointed to serve at the election: G. E. Millar, clerk, and Jules Hardouin, A. B. Kustentmacher, Steve Abney, commissioners.

At said special election the polls will open at 7 a. m. and close at 5 p. m., and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at 10 o'clock a. m. on the 4th day of October, 1918, said Parish School Board of St. Tammany Parish, La., will meet at Covington, La., in open session, proceed to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the results of said special election.
