### NOBLE WORK IN THE INFLUENZA.

The gloom of death is turned to one of horror when the icy hands are folded amidst squalor and contagious germs, or when the gentle touch that smooths the brow may bring back to loved ones at home the desolation of a sacrificed life. Yet the work of the Covington Red Cross the past week has found women whose home lives have never taken them beyond the simplest of domestic duties grappling with the hardest problems of sanitation, meeting the demands of physical exertion, braving the most harrowing scenes of suffering and disease—doing their duty as it must be done by the nurses of this noble order at the front. And some of these women are not strong. While these desolate scenes bring sorrow for the afflicted, they also bring pride in Covington and admiration for its women.

The sacrifice that kindles the eye of some beloved friend with responsive acknowledgment is atoned for in some degree by selfish gratification, but the sacrifice that is made to the unknown dead and the unknown living is only rewarded by the consciousness of duty to humanity, and the risk of life under such circumstances brings out the noblest qualities of the human being.

Those physicians of Covington who have passed sleepless days and nights in ministering to the afflicted during the trying hours when calls succeeded each other as fast as transfers could take them from one bed to another must also be remembered. While prompt action and care has saved Covington from the serious outbreak of influenza that has visited most sections, the several hundred cases had to be attended to by but seven physicians, two of whom were early stricken with the disease. The cases developed fast and many calls were from long distances beyond the town. Those physicians who with bloodshot eyes and worn out bodies struggled to every bedside they could reach will be remembered with gratitude.

The indications are that the influenza is checked and we may soon be free to attend to business without the fear of being saddened by news of death, but the loss of some who have long been associated with us will cast a gloom over this community for a long time to come.

### HAS A BIG JOB

G. S. Bilheimer, of Denver, Colo., has been appointed Southern department campaign director for the next big drive for funds to continue the war work being done by the Red Triangle forces in the army camps of the United States and overseas, army Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the War Camp Community Service, the Salvation Army, the National Catholic War Council, the American Library association and the Jewish Welfare board.

Mr. Bilheimer is one of the foremost men in the Y. M. C. A. movement. He is a member of the international committee of the organization, a member of the National War Work council and a master organizer and executive. He successfully directed the last army Y. M. C. A. drive for the Southern department, comprised of Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arizona and New Mexico, and was unanimously chosen for the larger responsibility of the approaching campaign, during which the country will be called upon to support the Y. M. C. A. and other important war work agencies.

Mr. Bilheimer will be located at Dallas during the campaign period. He will have an able corps of assistants and specialists on his staff to carry out the various activities connected with a campaign of the magnitude of the forthcoming financial drive.

Mr. Bilheimer was chosen to direct the entire United War Work campaign for funds to finance the work of the seven war work agencies because of his successful experience and his unusual ability. His selection came direct from the New York headquarters of the consolidated campaign, with the solid approval of the people of the six Southwestern states, who are under his leadership, to furnish their part of the \$170,500,000 which the nation will be called on to contribute between November 11 and 13.
