ORDINANCE NO. 72.

An ordinance requiring all male persons, over the age of sixteen years, and under the age of forty five years, who have resided or may reside in the Town of Covington, La., for a period of three months, and who are not freholders in said town, or students in regular attendance at some recognized institution of learning, to work on the streets and roads of the said Town of Covington, in cleaning or repairing the same, for a period of two days, during the year 1919. Providing an exemption therefrom upon the payment of Two Dollars to the Mayor, to be used by the Town Council in effecting such work. Providing a method of notification to such persons of the requisition of their services, and providing a penalty for the failure to appear when so called upon.

Whereas, owing to the increase of street maintenance, due to the advanced costs of material and labor, and the heavy use of said streets for transportation and drayage, and

Whereas, this additional burden of maintenance has been duly apportioned to the taxpayers and freeholders of the Town of Covington, and

Whereas, there is a large male population in said Town of Covington, La., over the age of sixteen and under the age of forty-five years, who pay no property or personal taxes, yet participate in the corporate benefits of said Town, and

Whereas, Section Ten of the Charter of the Town of Covington, La., provides for the assessment of not more than six days work upon the streets and roads of said town for each year, by male persons between

said ages, with the right of exemption therefrom on payment of one dollar for each day assessed. Therefore, for the purpose of meeting the abnormal conditions set forth in the above preamble, and for the further purpose of carrying into effect Section 10 of the Charter of said Town, and more nearly equalizing the burden of taxation:

Section 1 Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in special session convened, That it shall be the duty of every male person, over the age of sixteen years, and under the age of forty-five years, of whatever profession, occupation or calling, who has resided or may reside in the Town of Covington for a period of three months, is hereby required to work on the public streets and roads of said Town of Covington, La., in cleaning and repairing the same, for a period of two days for the year 1919; provided that all persons between said ages, who are freeholders in said town, or students in regular attendance at a recognized institution of education, are exempted therefrom.

Section 2 Be it further ordained, etc., That it shall be the duty of the Mayor of said Town; and he is hereby required, to notify in writing, all persons subject to the provisions of this ordinance, at least ten days previous to the day such labor is required, and the persons so notified shall be bound to appear for work on the day specified at the office of said Mayor.

It shall also be the duty of the Mayor to require the services of all persons coming within the purview of this ordinance, before the expiration of the year 1919, and such labor shall be carried on under the direction of the Street Commissioner and Marshal.

Section 3 Be it further ordained, etc., That any person whose services are subject to requisition as aforesaid, shall be exempted therefrom on the payment of Two Dollars for the two days work required under this ordinance, into the hands of the Mayor, immediately after the passage hereof, or on or before the day fixed in the notification by said officer, for his services to begin.

Provided further that such money shall be used by the Town Council in effecting work and improvement on said streets and roads.

Section 4 Be it further ordained, etc., That any person, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, who, after due notice as hereinabove provided, shall fail to appear at the office of the Mayor on the day specified in said notice, for the purpose of such work, or who, after appearing shall refuse to work, not having secured the exemption therefrom as hereinabove provided by the payment of the Two Dollars alternative assessment, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon trial and conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than \$10 or imprisoned in the town jail, subject to work on the streets, not more than 10 days, or both, in the discretion of the Mayor.

ORDINANCE NO. 73.

An ordinance to define motor vehicles and to provide for their registry, and imposing a license therefor, providing penalties for any violation of this ordinance.

Section 1 Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in special session, That a motor vehicle is hereby defined to be any vehicle operated by any power other than muscular power, and designed and intended for use on the public highways, roads and streets. Motor vehicles are classified into three sub-divisions. Any motor vehicle used exclusively in commerce for the carrying of transportation of merchandise on the public streets, is classified as a motor truck. Any motor vehicle containing only two running wheels arranged tandem, is classified as a motorcycle. All other motor vehicles are classified as motor cars.

Section 2 Be it further ordained, etc., That every owner of a motor vehicle which shall be operated or driven upon the public streets, alleys or thoroughfares of the Town of Covington, La., shall, except as otherwise provided, cause to be filed in the office of the Secretary of said Town, an application for registration on a blank to be furnished for that purpose by said Secretary, containing a brief description of the motor vehicle to be registered, including the name of the manufacturer and factory number of such vehicle, the character and amount of the motive power, stated in figures of horsepower, given where practical, in accordance with the rating established by the Association of Licensed Automobile Manufacturers; also the name and address of the owner of such motor vehicle; provided that if such motor vehicle is to be used solely for commercial purposes, the applicant shall so certify.

Section 3 Be it further ordained, etc., That upon the filing of such application and the payment of the license hereinafter provided, the Secretary of said Town shall assign to such motor vehicle a distinctive number, and without further expense to the applicant issue and deliver to the owner a certificate of registration and one number plate. Such plates shall be of distinctly different color each year, and there shall be a marked contrast between the color of the number plate and that of the numerals or letters thereon.

Such number plates shall be of four, at least five inches long by four, at least three inches wide, on which there shall be the abbreviation together with the distinctive number assigned such motor vehicle. If the vehicle be one registered by a dealer there shall be on said plate, in addition to the foregoing, the letter "M." Such number plate must be attached to the front of all motor vehicles so registered, in a conspicuous manner.

Section 4 Be it further ordained, etc., That all registrations must be applied within thirty days after promulgation of this ordinance, and shall expire on December 31, 1919. A new registration must be had each

PAY AND FILE INCOME TAX BEFORE MAR. 15

U. S. Internal Revenue Bureau Gives Warning That Severe Penalties Will Be Enforced.

WOMEN WITHIN LAW'S SCOPE; HOW THEY REPORT INCOME

The Income Tax drive comes to a close on Saturday night, March 15.

The payments and returns due on that date under the provisions of the new Revenue Law must be in the hands of local Internal Revenue Collectors before their offices close that night.

The Income Tax is being collected to meet the war expenses. Every person who shouted and tooted his horn on Armistice Day is now called upon to contribute his share of the cost of winning the war.

The laggards and the dodgers will face severe fines and jail sentences. The Internal Revenue Bureau announces that its officers will check us all up to see that every person who comes within the scope of the Income Tax law did his share.

Where to Pay and File.

Residents of Louisiana are required to make their returns and pay their taxes to John Y. Fauntleroy, Collector of Internal Revenue, New Orleans, La., or to any of his deputy collectors who are now doing free advisory work on Income Tax.

Payments sent by mail should be attached to the returns and should be in the form of check, money order or draft. Cash payments by mail are sent at the taxpayer's risk of loss.

If you are unable to make your return personally because of illness, absence or incapacity an agent or legal representative may make your return.

If there are any doubtful points as to your items of income or allowable deductions you should get in touch at once with a Revenue officer or a banker for advice.

Women Pay Tax.

Women are subject to all the requirements of the Income Tax. Whether single or married, a woman's income from all sources must be considered.

If unmarried or if living apart from her husband she must make her return for 1918 if her net income was \$1,000 or over.

If married and living with her husband her income must be considered with the husband's in determining the liability for a return. Their joint income, less the credits allowed by law, is subject to normal tax. The wife's net income is considered separately in computing any surtax that may be due. Husband and wife file jointly, as a rule. If the husband does not include his wife's income in his return the wife must file a separate return.

Severe Penalties.

The new Revenue Law places severe penalties on a person who fails to make return on time, refuses to make return or renders a fraudulent return. For failure to make return and pay tax on time, a fine of not more than \$1,000 is named and 25 per cent of the tax due is added to the assessment. For refusing willfully to make return or for making a false or fraudulent return there is a fine of not exceeding \$10,000 and imprisonment of not exceeding one year, or both.

Farmers' Income Taxable.

Every farmer and ranchman who had a fair or a good year in 1918 must heed the Income Tax this year. He must consider all his income as taxable. He is entitled to deduct from his gross income all amounts expended in carrying on his farm. The cost of farm machinery, farm buildings and improvements cannot be deducted. The cost of live stock, either for resale or for breeding purposes, is also regarded as investment.


Overtime and Bonuses Taxed.

Salary and wage earners must consider as taxable every item received from employers and from other sources. Bonuses and overtime pay are to be reported as well as the regular payments.

Allowances for Losses.

Losses sustained in 1918 and not covered by insurance are deductible items if incurred in the taxpayer's business or trade, in any transaction undertaken for profit or arising from fire, storm, shipwreck or other casualty or from theft.

to classifications known as a whole license fee and a half license fee. The whole license fee shall apply to all registrations made under the provisions of this ordinance prior to the first day of August, of each year; and the half license fee shall apply to all registrations made under the provisions of this act, made on or after the first day of August of each year. All licenses, except as hereinafter provided, shall be based on horsepower of motor, and shall be computed according to the following standard, to-wit:

D2 x N
2.5

D is the cylinder bore in inches; N the number of cylinders. The license fee shall be fifteen cents for each horsepower, provided that the minimum whole fee shall be Two Dollars and Fifty Cents. All motor cars shall be subject to this license. Motorcycles shall pay a flat license fee of One Dollar and Fifty Cents. Motor trucks shall pay a flat license fee of Six Dollars.

Persons, firms or corporations dealing in motor vehicles shall pay the license fee of one motor vehicle, on the maximum horsepower of each special make of motor vehicles handled, provided that dealer handling both new and second-hand motor vehicles shall pay the license on new makes only.

Section 6 Be it further ordained, etc., That the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to a motor vehicle owned by a nonresident of the Town of Covington, La., provided that the owner thereof shall have complied with the provisions of the law of the foreign country, State, Territory or Federal District, of his residence, or of the State of Louisiana, relative to registration of motor vehicles and the display of registration numbers thereof, and shall conspicuously display his registration number as required by law.

Section 7 Be it further ordained, etc., That the funds derived from the collection of license fees as above provided shall be used by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in the maintenance, repair and upkeep of the streets and thoroughfares of said Town.

Section 8 Be it further ordained, etc., That any person failing to register his motor vehicle, or to pay the license fee as herein provided,

FOURTH-CLASS POSTMASTER EXAMINATION.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Bogalusa, La., on March 8, 1919, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Talisheek, La., and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any va-

caney by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$335 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.
