

PROCLAMATION OF ELECTION.

Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish at a meeting of the said Police Jury held on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, 1919, J. B. Howze, president of the said Police Jury, hereby give notice that, in compliance with said ordinance, a special election will be held in the Parish of St. Tammany on the 15th day of April, 1919, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the constitution and laws of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of Seven Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$750,000) Dollars to run twenty-six (26) years from date of the said bonds, and to bear interest not to exceed five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing, improving and maintaining the public roads and highways of St. Tammany Parish.

For the purpose of holding said election the polling places will be as follows:

Second Ward, First Precinct—Sandy Ford, the regular polling booth provided by law.

Ward Four—Mandeville, La., the regular polling booth, to-wit: The Town Hall.

Fifth Ward—Bush, La., the regular polling booth provided by law.

Sixth Ward—Near Violin, La., the regular polling booth provided by law.

Seventh Ward—Lacombe, La., the regular polling booth provided by law.

Eighth Ward—Pearl River, La., the regular polling booth provided by law.

Ninth Ward—Slidell, La., the regular polling booth, to-wit: The Town Hall.

Tenth Ward—Abita Springs, La., the regular polling booth, to-wit: The Town Hall.

At said election the polls will be open at seven (7) o'clock a. m. to five (5) p. m., according to law.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance calling a special election in the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, That a special election be and the same is hereby called and ordered to be held in the said Parish of St. Tammany on April 15th, 1919, between the hours of seven (7) o'clock a. m. and five (5) o'clock p. m., and that at said election there shall be submitted to the taxpayers resident citizens of said parish qualified under the Constitution and laws of this State to vote at the said election, a proposition to authorize the police jury of the Parish of St. Tammany to incur debt on behalf of and in the name of the Parish of St. Tammany in the amount of Seven Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$750,000) Dollars, and to issue an ad valorem negotiable semi-annual interest bearing coupon bonds evidencing the said indebtedness (the amount of the said indebtedness being less than ten (10) per cent of the assessed valuation of the property in said parish); said bonds to run for a period of 26 years, and to bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, the principal and interest of said bonds to be payable in such amounts and at such places as the governing authority may determine, and both principal and interest of said bonds to be secured by a sufficient tax to be levied and collected each year in accordance with Article 281 of the Constitution and the laws of the State of Louisiana, the proceeds from the sale of the said bonds at no less than par to be used in constructing and improving the public roads and highways within the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana.

Be it further ordained, That there shall be published in the official journal of the Parish of St. Tammany, for thirty (30) days a notice of the said special election, said notice to embrace substantially all things above set forth and also notice that this Police Jury will meet in open session at the District Courthouse in Covington, La., at ten (10) o'clock a. m., on Thursday, the 11th day of April, 1919, and then and there proceed to open the ballot boxes used in said election, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the said election.

Be it ordained, That the President of the Police Jury be and he is hereby authorized and directed to have the necessary ballots printed for the said special election, which ballots shall contain the foregoing proposition and be drawn up in accordance with law and the provisions of this ordinance, and he is also authorized to arrange for providing the ballot boxes, the necessary blanks for tally sheets and compiled statements.

Be it further ordained, That the Clerk of Court and Ex-Officio Registrar of Voters shall furnish to the election officers hereinafter named for said special election with a list of the taxpayers in said parish entitled to vote in person or by proxy at the said special election, together with the assessed valuation of each taxpayer's property as shown by the assessment roll last made and filed prior to said special election.

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance granting ferry franchise.

Whereas, due notice has been given according to law for the sale of a franchise for the operation of a ferry for carrying of freight and passengers for hire across the Tchoufouca river between the towns of Houllonville and Madisonville; and

Whereas, the Ponchartrain Ferry

roads, which have not heretofore been built on account of the lack of provision in funds, now therefore

Be it resolved, That the following road building program be adopted for the year 1919-1920 for which roads are to be constructed in addition to those which are now at present in use:

St. Tammany-Lacombe road, Middle Road, Completion of Turnpike Road, Lacombe to Lake, Completion of Military Road, Completion of McDougall Road, Completion of Lee Road, Bennett Bridge Road, Road from Folsom to Bush, Bon Williams Road, Lacombe to Lake, Lacombe to Hammond-Tangipahoa Line road, St. Tammany-Abita Road, Hardsurfacing Pearl River road to Slidell, Hardsurfacing road to Slidell via Mandeville, Hardsurfacing Columbia road, Hardsurfacing Taisbeek to Columbia road, Hardsurfacing Holmesville road via Folsom to Parish Lane, Hardsurfacing Madisonville-Ponchartrain road, Hardsurfacing Magisonville-Covington road, Hardsurfacing Hammond-Covington-Slidell road, Chinchuba to Houllonville, Mandeville to Lewisburg, Lewisburg to Chinchuba-Houllonville road.

On motion of J. M. Smith, seconded by Hines Fenderson, the following resolution was introduced and unanimously carried:

Whereas, the proposed road bond issue, which has been this day submitted to the people of St. Tammany Parish, is a matter of extreme importance to the public at large as well as to this body; and

Whereas, if the said bond issue is carried, it will require the personal attention of able business men who can act as a Road Commission for the purpose of securing the very best results in the expenditures of the proceeds from the said road bonds and the construction of the said roads; and

Whereas, in order to obtain the most efficient service in the building of the said roads the general management of the project, the final execution of the same and the disbursement of the funds, it is desirable that the said committee shall be limited to as few in number as possible; now therefore

Be it resolved, That J. D. Grant, of Slidell; John Poitevent, of Mandeville; and Wm. S. Qwald, of Abita Springs, be, and they are hereby appointed as such road commissioners with full powers of administration relative to the construction and completion of the new roads, such as surfacing, remodeling, and all other incidental acts necessary to the carrying out of the above purposes, for which the above bonds shall have been voted.

And in the event of the failure or inability of any one of the said foregoing commissioners to act in the premises.

Be it further resolved, That the remaining commissioners shall have the right to nominate a successor to be one so incapacitated, which appointment shall be made by proper resolution of this Police Jury. Carried.
