RELIGIOUS DEPARTMENT.

Sunday School lesson for April 6. Subject: God, our Heavenly Father. Gen. 1:1-27; Psalm 103:1-14; Matt. 6:24-34.

Golden Text: "Our Father who art in Heaven, hallowed be Thy name." Matt. 6:9.

Beginning the first of April and running through September, we are to have a series of lessons on some of the great teachings of the Bible. I hope that my readers will follow closely this series, and will not only read what I say, but will carefully look up all references in the Bible. The first lesson properly begins with the Bible teaching about God, especially in His relations as Father. Down through the ages there have been many ideas of God. The ancient Hebrews were first to hold to one God. The nations around them worshipped many gods. While the Jews did worship the one true God, yet they did not have the conception of Him as Father. They served Him more through the wrath of God, or to gain His favor, and were not sacrifices prompted by love. But when Christ came to earth He taught a different idea of God. He taught that men should love God. The fear of God is mentioned in the Old Testament many times, but the love of God is mentioned but few times. This is reversed in the New Testament.

If God is a father who is a son? Let us allow the Bible to answer for us: "As many as received to them gave He the right to become the children of God." John 1:12. So then the Children of this Heavenly Father are those who accept Christ as their own personal Savior.

A Happy Life.

"He that would love life and see good days, let him refrain his tongue from evil, and his lips that they speak no guile; let him seek peace. For the eyes of the Lord are upon the righteous and His ears unto their supplication; but the face of the Lord are upon them that do evil."

Dr. E. Y. Mullins, of Louisville, Ky., called this "an ancient recipe for a happy life." The text contains two things:

The elements of a happy life, and the requirements for a happy life. Taking up first the elements of a happy life we find that the first element is found in the clause: "He that would love life." To be really happy we must love life. Life means a great deal to some people and scarcely nothing to others. I read in the paper a short time ago where a man had committed suicide. Life was nothing to him. I read not long since of a mother who had brought up eight children, and they were all successful christ-an men and women. Life meant nothing to her. The second element of this happy life is found in the clause: "And see good days." We have all had good days and bad days; we have had dark days and bright days. But the inspired apostle here tells us that all of our days may be bright.

Now these are the elements that enter into a happy life—to love and see good days—and now let us see

the requirements for this happy life. "Let him refrain his tongue from evil, and his lips that they may speak no guile." Oh, how we use our tongues to a great disadvantage for our happiness. I was especially interested during the war to see the different men arrested for disloyal talk. The tongue may be a blessing or it may be a curse, and we cannot hope to be happy unless our speech is pure and clean.

"Let him turn away from evil." We cannot hope to be happy and follow after the evils of the world. No wicked life is a happy life. "And do good." But simply being good will not bring happiness. We must do good. I once heard a minister say that some people were so good that they were good for nothing. The Apostle James tells us that we show our faith by our works. So if one is really good he will show it by doing good for others.

"Let him seek peace and pursue it." This is the last requirement of a happy life: That we should endeavor to live peaceful lives. First of all we should make our peace with our Heavenly Father, then as much as lieth in us live peacefully with all men.

Now the closing part of the text explains the reason why these things make a happy life: "Because the eyes of the Lord are upon the righteous, and His ears are open to their supplication." It means that God hears our prayers, and that He has interest in our lives, and that it is not a question of God getting right with us, but it is a question of us getting right with God.

And the last part of the text explains why the wicked people are not happy. "But the face of the Lord is upon them that do evil." A better rendering of the word "upon" in this clause is "against." It does not mean that God is angry, but that He simply turns His back upon the evil-doer.
