Louisiana, on the 3d day of June, 1919, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and the laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following propositions, to-wit:

To incur debt on behalf of and in the name of the town of Abita Springs, Louisiana, in the amount of ten thousand dollars, and issue and sell serial negotiable semi-annual interest bearing coupon bonds evidencing the said indebtedness, the said bonds to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. FOURTH-CLASS POSTMASTER EXAMINATION.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Bogalusa, La., on April 26, 1919, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Tallisheek, La., and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$335 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age

for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

POSTMASTER EXAMINATION.
