It is not our custom to commend unless we are asked to, and although you haven't asked for comments we cannot refrain from telling you the favorable impressions made upon our representative, by the good business methods employed by the bank, during his recent investigation of same.

All accounts and records were found to be in balance, and the records had been neatly and carefully kept, which reflects credit on the accounting department, and on the good business policy of the active officers.

While the examination was in progress, our representative was asked by outsiders, what connection, if any, there was between the Commercial Bank and Trust Company, and the St. Tammany Bank and Trust Company, which previously occupied the building now used by the former, which prompted him to have that thought in mind during his investigation, to determine if there was any connection between the two institutions.
