THE CONDEMNATION OF AN IMPARTIAL OBSERVER.

The Times-Picayune has been an impartial observer in the events of the gubernatorial campaign. Whatever sympathies it may have one way or the other have not been given expression, save to condemn the practice of mud-slinging. The receipt of the following letter, however, caused it to disclose the demoralizing and debasing conditions existing in New Orleans, under the caption, "The Vultures of Rue Royale," which we publish on the front page:

New Orleans, La.

To the Editor of The Times-Picayune:
 I have just written a letter to F. J. Mooney, superintendent of police, advising him of certain conditions existing along Royal and Bourbon streets, where gambling in all its more hideous forms is prevalent. I went into details with Mr. Mooney concerning my son, who was made an outcast by frequenting those awful dens of gambling and crime.

I also advised Mr. Mooney that if he does not take action at once, I would take the law into my own hands and start shooting up those gambling dens, as life holds no charms for me since my son has gone to the bad due to those awful gambling dens. I leave it to you, my dear sir, to co-operate with the police, and in the name of humanity, do something to save our young men. I am, (Name withheld)

This letter is the outpouring from a broken-hearted father; an overflow of long pent-up agony; the despair of a man whose happiness has been wrecked as a sacrifice to the greed of gamblers, nonproducers, leeches that suck the life-blood from the weakling and the unwary; nomadic porverts that round up the unsuspecting, tempt the credulous and shut out the sunlight from happy homes. It is a scorching condemnation of conditions existing under either the apathy or permission of the administrative departments of a great city. If the charges are true, and no one seems to doubt that they are true, the ring that now controls the city's affairs must not look to the country parishes of the state to do anything that would aid in keeping it in power. There will be no division of sentiment in this respect. It matters not whether it is North Louisiana or South Louisiana. There is no machine strong enough to reach into the home, into the church, into the business of the country and force the voter to vote for an organization that permits such a condition to exist.

THESE ARE THE KIND OF THINGS MR. PARKER IS FIGHTING. IF THEY EXIST THE CITY ORGANIZATION IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THEM. IF THE ORGANIZATION IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THEM AND COLONEL STUBBS DEFENDS THE RING, THEN THE PEOPLE WILL NOT ELECT COLONEL STUBBS; BECAUSE IT IS SUFFICIENT THAT THE RING IS ALSO ENDORSING COLONEL STUBBS AND TRYING TO SECURE HIS ELECTION.

The New Orleans Ring has a wonderful organization. It has controlled the city and is reaching out to control the state, but it will fall, just as New York, Cincinnati, San Francisco and other cities failed.

competent witnesses, and in the presence of as many others as chose to attend the examination and compilation of the returns of said election, and having ascertained from said inspection and compilation that the votes in number and amount cast at the aforesaid election held in said School District No. 1 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., for and against the proposition submitted to the taxpayers of said school district by a resolution of the School Board of the parish of St. Tammany, La., adopted October 3, 1919, to-wit:

Proposition to levy a three and one-half mill special tax on all the property subject to taxation in School District No. 1 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., annually for a period of six years for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of the said district.

For, or in favor of said proposition, there were cast twenty votes, representing a taxable assessed property valuation of thirty-two thousand three hundred eighty-two (\$32,382) dollars.

to number and amount, and having inspected and examined and canvassed the poll list, tally sheets and compiled statements of votes made by the commissioners and clerks presiding at said election and compiling the returns of said election, we replaced in the ballot box the poll list, tally sheets and compiled statements of votes cast at said election, and after having sealed the same we deposited the boxes with the secretary of the St. Tammany parish school board of the parish of St. Tammany, La., and having satisfied ourselves that the returns made by the commissioners and clerks presiding at said election are true and correct, and that the proposition submitted to the taxpayers qualified as election under the law and the constitution of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election held in School District No. 1 of St. Tammany parish, La., on November 12, 1919, was carried by a majority vote in number an amount of assessed valuation of the property taxpayers voting at said election.

The St. Tammany parish school board of St. Tammany, La., acting as commissioners of aforesaid election held in School District No. 1 of said parish, in open session assembled as aforesaid, hereby declare that the said proposition submitted to the property taxpayers of School District No. 1 by a resolution of the school board of St. Tammany parish, La.,




