

AN ORDINANCE.  
Sanitary ordinance relative to waste disposal.  
Section 1. It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any person to deposit any waste or refuse in the town of Covington to allow the

accumulation within any building, or upon any premises or other places owned, occupied, leased by him or them, or under his or their contract, of any of the following: Garbage, combustible material, waste paper, boxes, barrels, shavings, tin cans,

bottles or other non-combustible refuse, except as provided in Sections 3 and 5.

Section 2. Garbage not promptly consumed on the premises as stock or poultry feed, and manure not regularly turned under the soil as fertilizer, must be stored in fly-proof cans or bins or other receptacles, and made available for the garbage wagon, preferably every second day, or as officially designated, but at no longer intervals than seven days, since the prime sanitary feature of this ordinance is to interrupt the life-cycle of the typhoid fly, the malaria mosquito, the plague infected rat and other disease breeding insects and germs, which life-cycle begin in rubbish and decomposing matter, and in cans and vessels containing waste.

Garbage is here defined to mean animal and vegetable matter, kitchen waste, and decomposable refuse of any kind.

Section 3. Mineral waste and slow decomposing waste, shall be stored in boxes or barrels, or other receptacles, and regularly, at not greater intervals than seven days, exposed upon the sidewalk or other places accessible to the municipal wagons. If it is desired to keep lumber, wood, bricks or any waste of value in or upon any premises, such matter must be stored in a manner least dangerous from a sanitary standpoint, and, if it remains a health menace, through rats, mosquitoes or other mediums of infection, it must be stored upon a platform at least two feet above the ground, or removed or destroyed at the discretion of the health officer. Building material is exempt from this regulation, unless, in the opinion of the health officer it becomes a sanitary menace, when it must be elevated as herein provided.

Mineral waste is defined as mineral matter, as cans, bottles and bricks; slow decaying waste comprises solid vegetable matter, as paper and wood.

Section 4. Tree trimmings, plants and combustible garbage may be burned on the premises, if such acts are not a menace to health or property, and the ashes disposed of in the manner provided in Section 3 (Mineral Waste), or it must be carted away at the expense of the occupant or owner of the premises.

Section 5. Throwing or dumping of cans, bottles, paper, dead animals and other refuse in the streets and ditches, on the sidewalks, on public grounds, and in view of public roads is hereby prohibited.

Section 6. Mineral waste and slow decomposing matter may be used for filling excavations and wash-outs, provided that such filling is not, in the opinion of the fire or health officer, a fire hazard or a sanitary menace.

Section 7. Whenever any officer shall find a violation of this ordinance it shall be his duty to notify the occupant or owner of the premises to abate such nuisance within 48 hours, and, on failure of the owner or occupant to comply with the notice it shall be the duty of the officer to make an affidavit against such offender or offenders. Each successive notice shall be considered a separate offense, and punishable by separate fines.

Section 8. Whenever in this or other sanitary ordinances authority is delegated to "an officer," this term applies to and includes the chairman and health officer of the Municipal Health Board, or any duly authorized officer of the municipality.

Section 9. Any person or persons who shall fail or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on trial and conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00, or be imprisoned for a period of not more than 30 days, or both, at the discretion of the court.


