Why At Covington. The St. Tammany Parish Fair is the oldest in the Florida Parishes. St. Tammany is the largest parish in the group of parishes.

If it has not the best equipment of any parish fair in the state now, it can easily and justly make this claim when the next fair opens with all the improvements that the association plans to make.

This fair was one of the best in the state this year. This is the statement of a number of people who were judges or visitors at the different fairs in Louisiana this year.

Covington has ample facilities for caring for large crowds that might attend a Florida Parishes Fair, as regards grounds, meals and rooms.

This association was successful in getting special railroad accommodations this year, reduced rates on the Illinois Central and N. O. G. N. between all points in Louisiana and Covington, and a special train. It is believed that even better accommodations can be secured next year.

The five Eastern Florida Parishes can meet at Covington more easily than at any other town in the five parishes.

This Fair Association started a move to hold a joint fair between the parishes over a year ago. It also has offered premiums to exhibitors in the adjoining parishes for the 1918 as well as the 1919 fair, and paid over \$100 worth this year to these exhibitors. Our offer, therefore, should receive first consideration. PARISH FAIR PLANNING THINGS FOR THE FUTURE.

They had and going back for forty years. The stock bulls are community property. The stock books are kept by an expert supplied by the Farmers Club. All individual records are kept of each milk cow, milk and butter fat, feed, etc., so that you can tell at a glance what each cow is doing. No boarders allowed here. If any farm does not keep up to a certain standard in the matter of egg and milk production an expert is sent to investigate and the trouble is located. In this way they keep up their standard quality and are able to ship to England alone \$15,000,000 worth of products every year.

This farm has only sixteen milk cows and about 150 acres of land. They ship their milk to the factory where they make the butter. The cows are kept up most of the year in an open stall barn, bedded down in straw. They milk three times a day and ship once. The cows are magnificent animals, rolling in fat. There is much to be desired in the strape of sanitation. No concrete pits for the manure, but just thrown out into a back shed, the intervening yard knee deep in filth. What it must be in fly time the Lord only knows. No trace of fly screens here; the milk cans just inverted in the yard. They milk by hand and the whole work on this farm is done by the family; only one maid servant kept. The small daughter came in before we left. She was the only one that spoke English. We had to take their work for it. When introduced she bobbed in such a quaint manner to each and to the evident satisfaction of her fond parents who watched their daughter's company manners, flaxen hair, blue eyes, and a complexion that seemed too beautiful to be real. We were entertained in the parlor that had a good imitation stove in it. I saw the madame open the door of it several times, but no heat came out of that stove. Coal at \$40 a ton is probably the reason of the camouflage, but Lord, it was cold; they certainly could use that room for refrigerating purposes.

Intensive cultivation is the key note of all their farm work, and returning to the land, every particle of refuse vegetable matter is turned under. The conservation of humus is strictly practiced here. They have over-sold their cattle stock to Germany and are suffering in consequence. Labor seems scarce and is well paid. They are very anxious to know when they may expect more cotton seed cake from the States. They seem to depend very much on cotton seed meal for their milk stock. A short stay in this climate makes one feel that he never will want to go away from God's country—Louisiana—once he gets there again. The Sunny South is all and more than we think it is when you compare it with places like this.


