(Continued from page 1) It approved as a Junior High School. The libraries and book cases have also been ordered for the Folsom, Middle Roads, Pilgrim Pest, Sun, Oak Grove, Talisheek, Pearl River, Maud, Ridge, Union Grove, Waldheim, Progress and Sand Hill schools and also for the Slidell colored school. New teachers' desks, chairs and shades have been ordered for the Bonfouca school, and also new teacher's desk for the Lacombe school. New heaters have been received, installed at Folsom, Middle Roads and Progress schools since your last meeting, and a new one has been received for the Union Grove school which will be installed in the immediate future.

The deed has been passed selling the Ramsay school house site to the St. Tammany Lumber Co., with the understanding that we should have the use of the building the remainder of the present school year, and reserving the public school library now in that building. As this school will necessarily have to be consolidated with the Covington High School, I shall move the library books to the Covington school.

This board is paying money for the purpose of getting expert school people to come and address the institutes, and for the purpose of teaching the teachers how to do better work. It therefore seems nothing but reasonable to me that we should insist upon a full attendance at these institutes.


