

ATTEND TO YOUR COWS.

(Continued from page 1)
a hole through the cow's hide. The grub did not get in through that hole but he will come out through it. Press on one and see how the cow gives down. The place is sore. How did they get there? The wolf fly lays eggs on the animal's hair. When she licks her hair the eggs are taken inside. They hatch in the warmth of the cow's body into tiny worms, which bore through the alimentary canal wall, into the flesh of the animal, ranging in an upward direction, until they have bored a hole through the hide on the back. This hole is to admit air and for escape later. After the grub has nourished on the animal until it is

ready to go out and enter the ground where it completes its life history, developing into a fly, which starts a new life cycle in the fall.
What's the remedy? The remedy I will give, if practiced by every one, would be a preventative. Use the sewing machine oil can and inject a few drops into the hole in the hide at each lump or wold, one evening when the cows come home. This softens the hide, kills the insect, and lubricates the passage. Next morning fill the oil can with Mackie's Pine Oil. If this is done universally, like tick eradication, there would be no wolf flies or wolves much longer. The rabbits and squirrels would not keep them propagated in numbers enough to be serious. We do not hope to exterminate them, however, or prevent them, but we can remove them each year. The more cows we have, the bigger the job and the greater the need.

SCHOOL BOARD.

(Continued from last week)
The following report of the Elementary School Supervisor was received:

Supervisor's report for the months of November and December:

I have visited the following schools during the month of November: Sildell, Tallhaeck, Onward, Folsom, La-combe, Central, Pilgrim Rest, Union Grove, Waldheim, Ramsay, Progress, Bonfouca, Sun, Middle Roads, Oak Grove, Abita Springs, Covington.

I have now given the reading tests to all of the schools in the parish and the papers have been corrected and are now open to inspection. The results have been sent to each teacher so that they may see their pupils' grades and will know how to classify them in order to get the best results in remedying the situation and by knowing just how much effort is needed to be spent.

As I visit the schools I am keeping watch to see that the teachers give a period of the reading lesson to silent reading work which is very necessary in order to raise our present standing.

I have started out now with the spelling tests and with giving the spelling tests and this subject which is so closely related with reading will be followed up in the same manner as the reading work. We are working on a new outline prescribed to fit each pupil's individual needs and at the same time arousing a great deal of interest among the pupils in a school which is sure to bring results.

At the request of the State Rural Supervisor, Mr. John M. Foote, I am ready to mail him now the results of the reading tests given in this parish. This information will be sent to him for the purpose of issuing a bulletin showing parish and state results in comparison with other state results. As soon as all

of the spelling tests have been given they also will be sent.

I am very sure the tests which will be given toward the close of the session will show great improvement in the reading and spelling work for the reason that the teachers are putting forth the best of their energy along the line of remedial work and are very anxious to get all the help and information along this line possible.

During the twelve days in December I visited the Bonfouca, Covington, Sildell, Madisonville, and Abita Springs schools, and I met at the institute with the teachers at Sildell on the fifth and sixth where the results of the reading tests were discussed and school results compared. A few days were spent in my office in filing reports and office work in general while the weather was not good.

Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Evans, that the second ward special tax fund shall pay for the necessary material in order to build foot-walks for school children near the Bennett bridge, and also between the residence of Warren Willie and the Savannah Branch school, in the second ward. It being understood that the material shall not be paid for until the foot-walks are built by the patrons of the Savannah Branch school. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that the superintendent be authorized to secure a teacher for a school in the Populus Settlement, northeast of Folsom, in the second ward, provided the patrons of this school shall furnish a building suitable for this school and without cost to the parish school board. Carried.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Bancks who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Mr. O'Keefe.

Whereas, this board has a contract with Miss Edith Luecke to teach in the public schools of this parish during the session of 1919-20, and

Whereas, the Parish Superintendent consented to release Miss Edith Luecke from her contract in order that she might pursue her professional duties in the Sophie Newcomb College in New Orleans, La.,

Therefore be it resolved, That this board hereby expresses its approval of the above release, and formally grants Miss Edith Luecke a leave of absence for one year for the purpose of attending the Sophie Newcomb College, as above mentioned.

Upon roll call the above resolution was carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that the fourth ward school director and the superintendent be appointed as a committee with full authority to represent the board in attending to such matters as may be necessary in order to buy a site and build a public school house for negro children in the town of Mandeville, it being understood that all expenses necessary for construction of this house shall be borne by the fourth ward maintenance tax.

Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Bancks, that the school board pay the railroad fare for teachers attending institutes, and also ten cents a mile, one way, between the teacher's boarding place and the railroad. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bancks, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the superintendent is hereby authorized and instructed to deduct one day's pay from the salary of the teachers for each day they may be absent from any teachers' institute held in this parish without a just and sufficient reason. Carried.

The following report and recommendation of the Executive Committee was received and read:
Honorable President and Members St. Tammany Parish School Board.
Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned Executive Committee, met in the office of the Superintendent on the above date. After checking over and approving bills we discussed several matters of importance and beg to recommend that a large wall clock be purchased for the office of the School Board.

We are sorry to learn that many of our teachers do not attend the institute regularly. You are aware that we have authorized the spending of considerable money in order to secure competent talent to take part and address these institutes. For this reason we feel that we should insist upon having the teachers attend. We are supported in this feeling by the following letter from State Supt. T. H. Harris:

Dear Mr. Lyon:—Yours of the 11th is received, and in reply I beg to say that the law places the control of the teachers' institutes in the hands of the parish school boards. I think you have the legal right to consider your institute work a necessary part of your school program and to require the attendance of teachers. I believe you can legally dock a teacher for failing to attend an institute.

As some of these institutes may come on Saturday we would recommend that the board pay the mileage for teachers attending the institutes and fine all teachers one day's pay who do not attend.

Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Dutsch, that this board agree to contribute to the school house fund of the Madisonville colored school and \$250, provided the patrons of this school will raise the sum of \$250 from private sources. It being understood that the parish board shall not be called upon for this amount until some time in the school year 1920-21, and that the house be built, or purchased, by the said Madisonville colored school house building fund shall be in the name of the St. Tammany Parish School Board.

Mr. Dutsch, that the superintendent be authorized and instructed to set aside the sum of \$135 for the White Settlement colored school building fund, and that this be done at the request of the patrons of this school who have agreed that the length of their term for the present school session might be shortened 3 months. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the eighth ward school directors be authorized to have a fence built around the Pearl River school house grounds, and to be paid for from the first available unpledged funds belonging to the eighth ward special tax. Carried.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Talley:

Whereas, it is proposed by the State Superintendent of Education that a tour through a certain part of the agricultural section of the Middle West be made next August by a large delegation of Louisiana country boys, and

Whereas, it is the sense of this board that this trip will be of inestimable value to young country boys, therefore be it

Resolved, That this board recommends and endorses such a trip, and that they stand ready to aid and encourage, in any way possible, the sending of some St. Tammany boys on this trip.

Carried unanimously.
On motion by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Evans, the meeting adjourned subject to call.
