### STATE NOW HAS 108 SWEET POTATO HOUSES.

Records recently compiled by the horticultural department, Extension Division, Louisiana State University, show that Louisiana has 108 sweet potato storage houses with a total capacity of 629,400 bushels. Fifty of these with a capacity of 265,000 bushels were erected the past season (1919).

Although a splendid record for an industry yet in its infancy and representing a valuable asset to the crop production, the production of sweet potatoes has increased from 1,428,000 to 6,300,000 bushels more the erection of the first storage house. However, with a growing appreciation of the value of these houses and the fact that the horticultural department is offering free plans and specifications for any size house, the industry should experience a big increase the present year.



### HEALTH BOARD ORDINANCE.

Section 9—No room shall be used for stabling cows, or for storing dairy products which contains any source of noxious gases or infective organisms, nor shall any source of contamination be permitted within 25 feet thereof.

Provided that flush water closets having a flue extending above the building shall be permitted.

Section 10—Dairy enclosures must be graded and drained, and no garbage, fecal matter or similar substance shall be placed or permitted to remain in or on such enclosures.

Section 11—The sale or use of dairy products from cows afflicted with tuberculosis, splenic fever, anthrax or other disease is prohibited, and it shall be lawful for this board to cause cows to be tested, and, if found to be diseased, to order their isolation and treatment, or slaughter, at the expense of the owner or owners.

Section 12—Dairy attendants shall maintain strict cleanliness, and no person suffering from, or who has within a period specified by the health officer been exposed to contagious, infectious skin or venereal diseases shall work in or about any dairy.

Section 13—It shall be unlawful for any pedestrian, or for any vehicle upon or from which dairy products, are, or are being distributed, to carry any unwholesome matter, or any water or material with which cream or milk might be adulterated.

Section 14—The health authority shall have the right to at all times stop pedestrians and vehicle distributors of dairy products, and to enter the dairy or premises of any distributor for the purpose of examining the products and utensils and appliances thereon or therein; and distributors shall, on demand, allow inspection or entry, and furnish for examination samples of their products, not to exceed one pint.

Section 15—It shall be unlawful for any distributor to have with intent to sell or deliver milk from which the cream or part of the cream has been removed, unless a sign bearing in conspicuous letters the legend "Skimmed Milk," and the name of the distributor is attached to every container.

Section 16—Any unsanitary method or condition applying to dairies and dairy products, or fraudulent distribution of such products, not specifically regulated by this ordinance, is declared to be unlawful, if in the opinion of the sanitary inspector it is deemed a sanitary menace or fraud.

Section 17—"Dairy products" is here defined as milk, cream, cheese, buttermilk, and all products having milk as a base. "Distributors" is defined as producers, vendors and donors.

Section 18—Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$10, nor more than \$25, or imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or both, at the discretion of any court of jurisdiction.

Section 19—This ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its promulgation.
