

### CROPS THAT COMPETE WITH COTTON

Consider for a minute some figures: American cotton, the South's royal staple, brought \$13,000,000,000 in the past eleven years. American hay in the same period brought \$11,000,000,000. Wheat brought more than \$10,800,000,000, and corn produced a total of \$26,000,000,000, besides the value of the fodder. Even oats brought half as much as cotton. The growers of corn and wheat and oats and hay have become wealthy. The growers of cotton have received a scant living for the most

priceless of crops. Why? Because they have been beggared, driven down to poverty, by the one-crop, speculative system under which they have operated. But the South will no longer have to plead for a profitable price. By the system advocated by the American Cotton Association the price will be regulated by the legitimate laws of supply and demand and not by speculation. And with cotton the Southern cotton farmer will produce other profitable crops. The cotton growers will get a fair price this year—they will have more money to put into the bank.
