LOUISIANA WILL HAVE LARGEST POTATO HOUSE.

Louisiana will have the largest sweet potato storage house in the South when the 50,000 bushel house which is being erected by a company at Monore is completed. There has been an increase of 300,000 bushels in the sweet potato storage house capacity in North Louisiana within the last twelve months, according to M. Hull, sweet potato specialist, Extension Division, Louisiana State University, who recently made a tour of that section of the state. In ad-

dition to a number of new houses, he says, several companies will increase their storage facilities to double their present capacity. These companies are installing canneries. "This should revolutionize farming in the hill sections of North Louisiana," says Mr. Hull. "We have criticized the farmer for sticking almost exclusively to cotton when as a matter of fact he wasn't to blame. He realized that cotton was the only staple crop that he could grow for which there was an assured market at all times. His credit was gauged largely by his acreage in this crop. Such conditions should no longer exist now that he has a definite market for another very valuable crop, the sweet potato."


