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THE STATE MEMORIAL TO OUR PEOPLE.

The campaign in St. Tammany parish for the state memorial to the soldiers who fought to perpetuate liberty, many of whom sacrificed their lives to the cause, will commence May 3. Our quota has been placed at \$2500. This will be about ten cents for each man, woman and child in the parish. There are always a few who contribute largely to every call of this nature. Fifty people will probably contribute one-quarter of it. It is safe to anticipate that two hundred others will contribute another quarter, which means, under the new census, that the remaining 24,750 could make up the quota by paying one nickel each.

These figures are given to show how easily the money could be raised if nobody shirked. We owe it to posterity that some lasting expression of the sentiment of to-day should remind them of how their forefathers cherished liberty and made sacrifices for it.

This is a case in which you cannot afford to let George do it. If you do, the blush of shame may come to your cheek when your son or relative enters the State University and participates in the advantages of the memorial hall.

Harvey E. Ellis is chairman for St. Tammany parish. He will raise the money, because he is a man accustomed to accomplishing things. But let us all get together and show that the contribution of St. Tammany parish is a unanimous expression of a liberty loving people.

THE SPIRIT THAT BUILDS UP YOUR COMMUNITY.



DOUGHNUTS made the doughboy happy during the war and no wonder. There is nothing more wholesome and delightful than doughnuts or crullers rightly made. Their rich, golden color and appetizing aroma will create an appetite quicker than anything else in the world.

Here are the famous doughnut and cruller recipes from the New Royal Cook Book.

Doughnuts
2 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; stir in milk; add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder which have been sifted together and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick; cut out. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 60 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Afternoon Tea Doughnuts
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg

2 tablespoons shortening
2 tablespoons milk
2 cups flour

Beat eggs until very light; add sugar, salt, nutmeg and melted shortening; add milk, and flour and baking powder which have been sifted together; mix well. Drop by teaspoons into deep hot fat and fry until brown. Drain well on unglazed paper and sprinkle lightly with powdered sugar.

Crullers

4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beaten eggs; sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick and cut into strips about 4 inches long and 1/4 inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.

The largest electric sign in the world advertises


WRIGLEY'S
