Moved by Mr. Dutsch, seconded by Mr. Evans, that this board co-operate with the State Department of Education in conducting a summer school for colored teachers in St. Tammany parish during the coming summer, and that an appropriation of \$175 is hereby made to pay one-half of the expenses, it being understood that this summer school be held at such place as may be decided upon by the Superintendent. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that the Superintendent be authorized to secure a Jeans Agent for the session of 1920-21, under such conditions as the State Department of Education may require. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that the position of Elementary School Supervisor be continued for another year, at the same salary as paid in the year 1919-20. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Levy, that the sum of \$10 be paid to each of the following: Miss Mattie Richardson, domestic science teacher in the Covington high school; Miss Ruth Burns, domestic science teacher in the Slidell high school; Miss Ruby Reeder, of the Tallsheek school; Miss Pearl Williams, of the Central school. This amount to be given as part payment of their expenses incurred in attending convention of Southern Home Economics Association, held in New Orleans, March, 18, 19 and 20, it being understood that this fund shall come from the special taxes of the wards in which these teachers are now teaching. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bancks, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the second ward school director be authorized and empowered and instructed to sell the Middle Roads school transfer wagon. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that a committee be appointed to investigate the wisdom of installing steam heating equipment in the Mandeville junior high school, and to report probable cost at the next meeting, should it be thought advisable to install such an outfit. The president appointed the fourth ward director and the superintendent to serve as that committee.

At 12 o'clock the meeting adjourned to meet at 1:15 p. m.

Afternoon Session.
At 1:15 p. m. the meeting was called to order by Dave Evans, vice-president, and all members present except N. H. FitzSimons, president.

Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Bancks, that the schools of the second ward run for a nine months term, provided the attendance of the eighth month should appear to justify it, otherwise they will close at the end of the eighth month, and an amount equivalent to the teachers salaries for the ninth month be appropriated from the second ward special tax fund to be used for improvements in the school buildings in the ward. Carried.

At this time N. H. FitzSimons, president, arrived and took the chair. The following petition from the patrons of the Mandeville junior high school was read:

The Hon. President and Members of the School Board of St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned patrons of the Mandeville junior high school, hereby respectfully petition your honorable body to take such steps as may be necessary to advance our school to the position of a Senior High School, such changes to begin with the session of 1920 and 1921.

Signed by Dr. R. B. Paine, D. B. Smith, Sidney Smith, Emile Dubourg, Isidore Levy, and seventeen others.

It was moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the superintendent be asked to refer this petition to the State Board of Education for their recommendation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bancks, seconded by Mr. Evans, that all teachers shall be notified that this board will not consider itself responsible for the salaries of teachers when their schools are closed, unless the orders to close came from the Parish Superintendent of Education. It is expected that the Superintendent will hold himself ready at all times to issue such orders as will meet the requirements of the state, parish and municipal boards of health, and of the mayor and town council of municipalities where there is no acting board of health. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bancks, seconded by Mr. Talley, that the committee consisting of the sixth ward school director and the superintendent, appointed by this board as a recent meeting, to attend to the building of houses for teachers in the sixth ward, shall be authorized to take from the sixth ward special tax enough to pay their traveling expenses to such nearby towns as they, in their judgment, may think necessary to visit, in order to secure material and make such plans as may be necessary in attending to the building of houses for teachers as above mentioned. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Bancks, that this board adopt, as a schedule of salaries for teachers, that schedule recommended by the conference of parish and state officials held in New Orleans, December 20, 1919. On roll call the following members voted in the affirmative: O'Keefe, FitzSimons, Talley, Evans, Keller, Banks, Sebastian. No: Levy and Dutsch.

At this point the president called the vice president—Dave Evans, to the chair.

Moved by Mr. FitzSimons, seconded by Mr. Sebastian, that the salary of the principal of senior high schools shall be raised for the year 1920-21 to \$2700 a year, and to be paid in twelve equal monthly payments, should the principals so desire. Upon roll call the following voted in the affirmative: O'Keefe, FitzSimons, Evans, Bancks, Sebastian, Dutsch and Talley. Negative: Levy, Keller and Oswald.

SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS
(Continued from last week)

Moved by Mr. Dutsch, seconded by Mr. Evans, that the Superintendent be instructed to have the boundary line surveyed by a competent engineer, of section 16 up to 8 south, range 12 east, and after the survey, a committee consisting of H. H. Levy and I. H. Keller, school directors of the fourth and seventh wards, respectively, are instructed to again advertise the standing timber on this land for sale in accordance with Sec. 59 of Act 120 of 1916, as amended by Act 142 of 1918, which states that all sales of timber on Sixteenth Sections shall be executed by the Superintendent and Treasurer of the Parish School Board. Carried.
