Acceptance of State and Federal Aid. Extract from the minutes of the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, held this 13th day of April, 1920:

Be it remembered, That the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, met in the courthouse in the city of Covington, St. Tammany, Louisiana, on the above date, regular session convened, with the following members present: J. B. Howze, President; Theo. Dendinger, H. N. Fendlasson, J. M. Smith, S. R. Cowart, F. Crawford, W. H. Davis, E. P. Robert, A. J. Bennett.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had and ordered recorded: By Mr. A. D. Schwartz, attorney: Whereas, the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, under resolution of April 13th, 1920, and under the provisions of Act 49 of 1910, petitioned the State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, for Federal Aid and Supervision and for Federal Aid in the construction of the Slidell-Pearl River Highway, and

Whereas, the State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, has made the necessary surveys, and has submitted a report, together with maps, plans, profiles, typical sections, etc., relative to the location, length, quantities and estimated cost, etcetera, of said highway, situated in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, between Slidell and Pearl River Station, same being approximately 6.5 miles long, and

Whereas, the State of Louisiana, through its Highway Department, Board of State Engineers has agreed, provided it can secure aid from the Federal Government, to extend the Parish of St. Tammany the sum of \$30,000, or approximately 50 per cent of estimated cost out of funds available during the year 1920, and the sum of \$..... from funds that will be available during the year 19..... towards the cost of constructing the aforesaid highway, and provided that the Parish of St. Tammany has on hand, or will secure without delay, all additional funds necessary for the construction of this highway, and the maintenance of same after completion, therefore

Be it resolved by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, that President J. B. Howze or his successor, be, and he is hereby instructed, authorized and empowered to accept the offer of State and Federal Aid made by the State of Louisiana through the State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, on the construction of the above highway, as indicated on maps, plans, profiles, and as described in report submitted by the State Highway Engineer, and embracing a total distance of approximately 6.5 miles. Be it further resolved, etc., That the President of the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, through the State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, and the Federal Government, through the Department of Agriculture, Office of Public Roads and Rural Engineering, and to any and all things necessary in the premises, be instructed, authorized and empowered to sign, make and execute contract for the construction of the above mentioned highway, on such terms and conditions as he may deem proper in conjunction with the State of Louisiana, through the Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, and the Federal Government, through the Department of Agriculture, Office of Public Roads and Rural Engineering, and to any and all things necessary in the premises.

Be it further resolved, etc., That the President of the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish notify the Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, that the Parish of St. Tammany has, in addition to the \$30,000 construction funds, heretofore mentioned, to be used in the construction of the Slidell-Pearl River Highway, the sum of \$1500, which sum is derived from the 1 1/2 mill direct tax, which for the year 1920 will yield approximately \$2000. This fund, or as much thereof as may be necessary, will be applied to the maintenance of the Slidell-Pearl River Highway, and will be available each year after the completion of the highway.

Be it further resolved, etc., That if the cost of constructing the proposed highway should exceed the estimate as made by the State Highway Engineer, the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish promises and pledges itself to raise such additional fund as may be necessary to complete the work.

Be it further resolved, etc., That the President of the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, make formal request upon the State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, to proceed to, as soon as possible, prepare form of contract, plans and specifications, and to advertise the above mentioned highway, and invite sealed proposals for the construction thereof.

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Whereas, the State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, has made the necessary surveys, and has submitted a report, together with maps, plans, profiles, typical sections, etc., relative to the location, length, quantities and estimated cost, etcetera, of said highway, situated in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, between Covington and the Parish Line towards Hammond, same being approximately 8.3 miles long, and
