It was moved by H. N. Fenderson, seconded by W. H. Davis, that Mr. Geo. H. Koepf, Jr., be nominated for the position of Parish Treasurer.

A vote for the position of Parish Treasurer was called, which resulted as follows: Geo. Koepf, Jr., 6;

Afternoon Session.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the police jury meet as a Board of Reviewers on June 22d, 1920.

It was moved and seconded that W. E. Blossman be authorized to purchase a typewriter for the clerk's office. He is to pay the price of same back to the police jury when his office has a surplus. Carried.

It was moved by J. M. Smith, seconded by W. H. Davis, that H. B. Pruden's claim for money due him in connection with the building of the Padras bridge be rejected, as there was nothing in the minutes of the police jury to show any connection with Mr. Pruden in the matter or where the police jury had authorized said bridge to be built. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that bids be asked for the decking on steel bridge at Lacombe, timber to be used 3x8 heart pine (sized), also one inch to be cut off of the stringers of the bridge. All bids to be sent to the secretary of the police jury sealed. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance providing for the closing of certain sections of roads to traffic during construction; the regulation of traffic over the newly constructed roads during and immediately after rains, and at such other times when in the opinion of the Good Roads Commission, the Parish Engineer, or other duly constituted road officials of this Parish, the roads are being improperly used; and providing a penalty for the violation of same.

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, That for the purpose of protecting the public roads, either pending construction or for such time after as may be deemed necessary for the preservation of said roads, the Good Roads Commission is hereby vested with the authority of temporarily closing to traffic those sections of new roads, which are now being or may hereafter be constructed, provided that any sections so closed shall be properly set off by barricades displaying the proper signs at such barricades.

Be it further ordained, etc., That no automobiles, log wagons, or other heavy vehicles, such as trucks, tractors, etc., shall be allowed on said roads during and immediately after rains when, in the opinion of the Good Roads Commission, the Engineer, or other duly constituted road officers, such vehicle would do damage to the road, provided that in all cases it shall rest with the discretion of the Parish Road Engineer to regulate traffic conditions over the said roads at unseasonable times according to such provisions as the Good Roads Commission may see fit to establish, provided that any regulations so established by said Commission shall be properly posted along such portions of the roads in such manner as may give due notice to the traffic involved.

Be it further ordained, etc., That any one violating any of the provisions herein contained shall be fined in a sum not exceeding fifty (\$50) dollars or be imprisoned in the parish jail for a period of not more than thirty (30) days, or both, at the discretion of the Court, and all fines so collected shall be paid over to the Treasurer of the Parish for the account of the Good Roads Fund.

Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its promulgation.
