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A COMMUNITY HALL FOR COVINGTON.

The M. C. E's., with characteristic community interest, have offered their club rooms and their library for a community hall for Covington. The plan seems to be very popular. It certainly is a fine opportunity for Covington. But before we go any further let's pinch ourselves and wake up, for we have been asleep for twenty-two years.

In 1898 a handful of girls got together in Covington and organized the M. C. B. Club. Just what mysteries its inner circle concealed no one seemed to know, but it gave theatricals and entertainments and raised money enough to establish a public library of no small proportions, and finally bought the club house erected by the young men of Covington and turned it into a library room and quarters for themselves. For years they have struggled to interest the public in the library. One dollar a year and a membership sufficient to meet expenses was the business side of the plan, but the object was entirely philanthropic and altruistic. They were disciples of education. They felt that knowledge was the magic wand that turned indifference into longing; that gave moral strength and tone to society; that built one city greater than another and brought into the home the capacity for enjoyment and the power to make others happy. In fact they were way ahead of their surroundings in the conception of their plans.

One of their agreements was that no married woman could be a member. Girls like those don't stay single long, because the men won't let them, and the ranks thinned out until none of the old members remained active except by suspension of the rules. Family duties first.

While the M. C. E's. are doing a big thing for Covington in turning their club rooms into a community hall, and while public appreciation will go out to them, it is to be hoped that a more lasting memento of this appreciation will be given by some association of those three letters with Community Hall itself. We know what this little band of loyal patriots have done, but the stranger and the future resident must be left to inquire what the mystic M. C. B. has to do with Community Hall.

Right now, we believe the M. C. E's. would appreciate a practical demonstration that their work has not been in vain. If the public will join solidly in the movement to make Community Hall a success, it will give something to Covington that is greatly needed and that most towns of its size, have and it will partly make up the debt of gratitude that is due.
