Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that Mr. P. A. Ross be appointed as principal of the Tall-sheek school for the session of 1920-21, with the understanding that he shall pay out for the teacher's cottage owned by the Parish School Board, and also see that the assistant teachers are provided with good boarding accommodations.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Talley, that a public school be opened next school session in the Lee neighborhood, west of Folsom, on the Tchoufouct river, provided the patrons of the school will furnish free to the Parish Board satisfactory building and equipment, and that the Board shall be at no expense other than the paying of the teacher's salary.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Talley, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the Superintendent be authorized to advertise for bids and award contracts for the building of a teachers' cottage to be located on the Central school house land, in the Sixth Ward, according to plans and specifications prepared by P. S. Barell, architect, and that the following shall be appointed building committee, to attend to all necessary business arrangements: Mr. Evans, the President of the Board and the Superintendent.

Moved by Mr. Talley, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the Central school teachers committee be appointed to attend to all matters connected with the building of a school house for the Galloway school, near the Abney Ranch, on the site purchased from Thomas & Parker.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Sebastian, that the schools for the session of 1920-21 shall begin on Monday, September 28, and close for the Christmas holidays at noon, December 23, and that school shall open after the holidays on Monday, January 3.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Sebastian, seconded by Mr. Talley, that the Superintendent be directed to appoint one teacher in each of the Senior High Schools to be librarian for that school, who shall be held strictly responsible for the care of the books, including the giving out and receiving of the books, and that the salary for this work shall be \$10 per month.

Carried. The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Sebastian who moved it adoption. It was seconded by Mr. Talley:

Whereas, it appears that this Board will require certain funds to meet salaries due and to become due between now and the early part of the year 1921, and until the amount due from the sources of our regular school funds can be realized upon, either by collection throughout the parish or by state apportionment, and whereas, according to Section 62 of Act 120 of the General Assembly of 1916, this Board is especially authorized to borrow money to meet current expenses and to pledge the revenues of the current year;

Therefore be it resolved, That the President of this Board be, and he is hereby authorized to negotiate with the fiscal agent, the Covington Bank & Trust Co., of Covington, La., for a loan of \$2,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary to meet salaries, etc., now due and to become due until such time as the tax shall be collected according to law, for the payment of said loan. The revenue to be pledged for the payment of this loan is the regular, or general fund of the Parish School Board. Adopted unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Talley, seconded by Mr. Evans, that the Superintendent be authorized to pay for fencing two acres of the Progress school house site so that the school building may be enclosed by this fence, it being understood that the patrons of this school shall be called upon to furnish the necessary fence posts. The expense of this work shall be taken from the District No. 5 special tax fund.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Talley, that the Parish Board pay to the Pearl River Methodist Church \$10 per month from the District No. 8 special tax fund for rent of the said Methodist Church during the time that it was occupied for a school during the session of 1919-20.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the Superintendent be authorized to take such steps as may be necessary for the teaching of the tenth grade in the Mandeville High School, beginning with the session of 1920-21, and that no changes shall be made that will in any way cause the said Mandeville High School to be taken from the 1st of State approved high schools.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Sebastian, seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that as the best assistants in the Junior High Schools are required to teach some grade, and some high school work, they shall have added to their salary as grade teachers, an amount equal to one-half the difference between the
