



During 1919 the net gain was 254 per cent greater than the average gain for the four previous years. If the rate of net gain during the first five months of 1920 is maintained throughout the year, the 1920 gain will be 293 per cent greater than the normal average annual gain.

The average number of calls made from the exchange stations has greatly increased, so that the Company is now furnishing several hundred thousand more exchange messages, from the same number of telephones, than ever before.

The volume of toll service during 1919 was 42 per cent greater than during 1915, and if the volume of toll service for the first five months of 1920 is maintained throughout the year, the volume of toll service during 1920 will be 59 per cent greater than during 1915.
