

## AMERICANS ASKED TO STAY AT HOME

SIGHTSEERS SHOULD KEEP OUT OF EUROPE UNTIL PEOPLE GET ON FEET AGAIN.

### BAPTISTS ENLARGE WORK

Mission Secretary Will Recommend How Evangelistic, Educational and Benevolent Program Can Be Carried Out.

Americans should keep out of Europe, unless they have important business there, until Europeans have had an opportunity to get on their feet again, declares Dr. J. F. Love, secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Dr. Love, as chairman of a commission named by the Baptist 75 Million Campaign to visit Europe and make a survey of the mission fields there, has just returned from a five months' tour of the continent. He says Americans have distributed cash with such a lavish hand in many places on the continent that the people have become convinced that every American has money to throw away and as soon as they spot a citizen from this country they proceed to overcharge him for everything he buys and every service rendered. Unless Americans forego sight-seeing in Europe for a few years a lot of the natives there will become professional beggars, in Dr. Love's opinion.

Baptists Suffered Heavily. Along with the other religious denominations Baptists suffered heavy losses of property in Europe during the war. Dr. Love reports, but he found that such Baptists as survived the war remained loyal to their convictions and they are now ready to welcome the aid and co-operation of American Baptists in the rehabilitation of their countries and the propagation of the gospel. From the contact formed with the Baptists of the chief countries of Europe by these representatives of the Southern Baptist Convention Dr. Love believes there will ultimately be formed a co-operative alignment of the Baptists of the world that will make them larger factors in world evangelization than they have ever been before.

#### Carry on Relief Work.

While the program which Southern Baptists will carry on in the European countries which they have not occupied before will not be determined until after the commission has reported to the Foreign Mission Board, members of the commission found crying need for money with which to meet cases demanding immediate relief and called home for funds to be employed in this connection in northern France and Belgium. This money was promptly forwarded and has been distributed through an agency set up in Paris in conjunction with the Foreign Missionary Society of the Northern Baptist Convention. Prior to the visit of this commission, missionary work by Southern Baptists in Europe has been con-

fined to Italy and Bohemia. However, the commission visited England, Scotland, France, Belgium, Holland and Italy, but found it impossible to get into Czechoslovakia, the Balkans and Russia at this time. Palestine and Egypt Visited. After the tour of Europe had been completed, the commission, which included Dr. Z. T. Cody, editor of the Baptist Courier, of Greenville, S. C., and Dr. Everett Gill, formerly missionary to Italy, but now a pastor in Kansas City, went to Palestine to look into the missionary work there formerly done by the Baptists of Southern Illinois, but recently taken over by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. A trip into Egypt for the purpose of studying the Mohammedan situation was made by the party while awaiting a ship on which to return to Italy. So far, Christianity has made very little inroad on Mohammedanism anywhere. Dr. Love found, though some of the missionary agencies in Palestine have been established for more than a half century. He anticipates a better chance for the Christian religion there, following British occupation of that country.

### Establish Orphanage in Rome.

By reason of the liberal response from the native Christians in the various mission fields to the 75 Million Campaign, many improvements on those fields have been made possible. Among the enlargements already provided for are an orphanage in Rome, the addition of a girls' department at Rio College in Brazil, and land for a girls' school at Sao Paulo, Brazil. The Interior China Mission was asked for \$7,500 for the campaign, and the missionaries there subscribed this alone, while the native converts added \$4,500. The North China Mission has subscribed \$50,000, while Brazil will respond with nearly \$1,000,000. In South Brazil the campaign as it was carried on in the South, was duplicated with all the special days and other extraordinary efforts and the response is far beyond the anticipations of the Foreign Mission Board. In Argentina, the quota asked was \$75,000, while the returns from that country have already reached \$125,000.

### SCHOOL BOARD.

(Continued from page 1) Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Sebastian, that a school transfer be operated from Galloway school neighborhood to the Peace Grove school, both in the Sixth Ward, and that the contract for operating this transfer be awarded to D. T. Davis, for \$75 per month. It being understood that the expenses for operating this transfer shall be taken from the Sixth Ward special school tax fund and that the Superintendent is hereby instructed to secure a second teacher for the Peace Grove school. Carried unanimously. Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Levy, that bids be opened for the operating of Waldheim school transfer running from the Military Road. Carried. The following bids were received: W. W. Jenkins, \$110

per month; S. King, \$95. Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Talley, that the contract be awarded to Mr. King for the sum of his bid. The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Oswald, who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Mr. Evans: Whereas, the St. Tammany Parish School Board has no public school building in the Town of Abita Springs, and Whereas, the Town Council of Abita Springs has passed a resolution offering to lease the Town Hall to this Board to be used for school purposes for a period of five years for the sum of \$1.00 per year, therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board does hereby accept this offer, and authorizes and instructs its president to represent this Board in the signing of such a lease. Unanimously carried. The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Talley, who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Mr. Oswald: Whereas, it appears that this Board will require certain funds to meet salaries due and to become due between now and the early part of the year 1921, and until the amount due from the sources of our regular school funds can be realized upon, either by collection throughout the parish, or by state apportionment, and

Whereas, according to Section 62 of Act 120 of the General Assembly of 1916 this Board is especially authorized to borrow money to meet current expenses and to pledge the revenues of the current year; therefore, be it Resolved, That the President of this Board be and he is hereby authorized to negotiate with the fiscal agent, the Covington Bank & Trust Company of Covington, La., for a loan of \$50,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary to meet salaries, etc., now due and to become due until such time as the taxes shall be collected according to law, for the payment of said loan. The revenue to be pledged for the payment of this loan is the regular, or general, fund of the Parish School Board. Adopted unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Sebastian, that the Parish School Board appropriate the sum of \$2500 from the first available funds to the credit of the District No. 2 special tax fund to be used toward furnishing the necessary expenses in the building of a gymnasium to be erected on the grounds of the Covington High School. Carried. Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Banks, that the Fifth Ward School Director and the Superintendent be authorized to receive bids and to award contract for the driving of a flowing well on the grounds of the Sun Public School. The well to be driven under conditions and terms and at such place as said School Director and Superintendent may decide upon. Carried. Moved by Mr. Talley, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the President and Superintendent be authorized to sell the ten acres of land recently purchased from Warren and Walter Pierce for the Sun colored school. It being understood that the price shall not be less than the total expense incurred by this Board in the securing of the title to this land. Carried.

A resolution was presented from the citizens living along the Abita and Mandeville road asking that the School Board should request the Police Jury to place that road in a condition such that their children could walk over it in attending the Mandeville school. Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Sebastian, that the Superintendent be instructed to send a copy of the request received from these patrons to the Police Jury and urge upon them the necessity of improving this road at their very first opportunity. Carried unanimously.

At twelve o'clock, upon motion duly seconded, it was moved to adjourn for lunch until one o'clock. Promptly at one o'clock the meeting was called to order by the vice-president with the following members present: Geo. R. Dutsch, ward 1; T. J. O'Keefe, ward 2; H. H. Levy, ward 4; W. W. Talley, ward 5; Dave Evans, ward 6; I. H. Keller, ward 8; W. J. Sebastian, ward 9; W. Oswald, ward 10. Absent: N. H. FitzSimons, ward 3.


Moved by Mr. Dutsch, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that the four high school principals be requested to attend the high school conference to be held in Baton Rouge on October 14, 15 and 16, and that this Board authorize the Superintendent to pay their necessary railroad and hotel expenses incurred in following these instructions, provided that the principals will furnish an itemized list of their expenses. At this time N. H. FitzSimons, president, arrived and took the chair. Moved by M. Levy, seconded by Mr. Dutsch, that the Superintendent be authorized to have telephones placed in the offices of the two junior high schools, and the monthly rent for these phones to be paid from the district special tax in which these schools are located. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Banks, seconded by Mr. Keller, that the Superintendent and President be authorized to pay from District No. 11 special tax fund the cost of material to build foot walk across Kimball Flat leading to the Waldheim school. It being distinctly understood that this material shall not be paid for until the walks are built, and that the Board shall not be held responsible for the expense of building these walks beyond paying for the material. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Banks, seconded by Mr. Sebastian, that a small wood shed be built at the Pearl River school. Carried. On motion duly seconded it was voted to adjourn subject to call.
