In Spite of Bad Weather the Returns From the Fair Will More Than Pay Expenses and Big Preparations are in Anticipation for Next Year

In spite of rain, mud and disagreeable weather generally, the management of the St. Tammany Parish Fair are to be congratulated upon its being a financial success. The gross receipts will approximately be \$7000, which will leave a net earning of several hundred dollars. This is a most remarkable showing and is due to the energy put into the fair work.

Wholesale Killing Is Investigated



Maj. Gen. George Barnett, former commander of the marines, who has reported that practically indiscriminate killing of the natives of Haiti had been disclosed as a result of an investigation. His report, which totals 109, admitted that 2250 natives were killed either by the American marines or by the gendarmes (native constabulary) during the period the American naval forces occupied those islands of the West Indies.

COVINGTON-WALDHEIM R. F. D. ROUTE LENGTHENED.

The following order has been issued on the Covington-Waldheim Rural Route:

From November 1, require carrier to travel three times a week on the trip from Waldheim north on the Ben Williams road via Galloway to the point of intersection with Military Road, returning over that road and the present route to Covington; increasing the distance 6 miles, one way, equal to 1.5 miles and back of six times a week service; allow contractor \$154.29 per annum additional pay.


